OXFORD WINS. - The Oxford-Cambridge boat race took place on Saturday and resulted in a victory for Oxford. SAVING DROWNING ACCIDENT. - At North River yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, Fulton McEwen, 17 years of age, son of Mr. Ewen McEwen, came to an untimely death by the upsetting of a sail boat, which capsized during a sudden squall. No other persons were in the boat. The body was recovered at 4 o'clock, and an inquest held thereon by Dr. Alex. Marchison, when a verdict of accidental drowning was rendered. The funeral will take place from his father's residence, Clyde River, to-morrow afternoon.

THE FASTNET. - The steamer Fastnet arrived from Halifax via Hawkesby, Canoe, Anichat and Souris, about ten o'clock this morning, for all of which ports she had good freight. She had one passenger for Charlottetown. The Fastnet will call at Sumner on her way back to Halifax should the ice permit. The passenger reports considerable ice outside Souris but none in the straits. During the winter the Fastnet has been overhauled and put in condition for a good season's work. The same efficient staff of officers as last year are again to the fore. We wish the Fastnet and all concerned a successful season. noidwly

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE I. C. R. REDUCTION.

Criminal Law Amendments.

OTTAWA, April 13.

It is understood that the reduction of staff on the Intercolonial Railway will be about 440.

It is intended to abolish unlimited franking privileges. Members of Parliament will be paid fixed sum for postage expenses.

Sir John Thompson in the House moved his resolution in regard to criminal prosecutions and the civil suits now in courts against McCreedy, Connolly and others, asking out of proceedings before privilege and election committees.

He moved that the evidence given before the Parliamentary Committee be used in prosecutions. Mr. Mills objected to using evidence of accused parties themselves given before Parliamentary committees in criminal prosecutions.

Mr. Davies also objected and wanted the resolution amended by prohibiting the use of testimony given by a witness in proceedings against himself. The resolution was carried.

Sir John Thompson moved the second reading of the criminal law amendment. He referred to it briefly, pointing out that it covered between 300 to 400 pages, it comprised introductory provisions for offences against public order, international and external offences affecting the administration of law and justice, offences against person and reputation, offences against rights of property and rights arising out of contracts and offences connected with trade procedure, proceedings after conviction and actions against persons administering the criminal law repealed.

In respect to abolition of grand juries, Sir John Thompson said that he was favorable to such, but no action would be taken for the present. Laurier did not agree with this. He was still conservative in this regard and wished retention of grand juries. The bill was read a second time.

The Judges' Salaries.

OTTAWA, April 13.

Sir John Thompson has given notice of a motion to increase the salaries of Superior Court Judges throughout the Dominion; increase amounts to \$1,000 each, except District Superior judges of Quebec, who receive \$500 additional. Following will be the salaries of the judges in the Maritime Provinces: Chief Justice, Nova Scotia \$6,000; six judges same court, each \$5,000; Chief Justice, New Brunswick, \$6,000; Judges in Equity, \$5,000; four puisne judges same court, \$4,000; Chief Justice, P. E. Island, \$5,000; two assistant judges, each \$4,500; the two latter increases are \$1,300 each, but all the fees heretofore payable therein are abolished.
