The activities of the Guild during the past season were outlined by the president who stated that one of the main difficulties this year had been the lack of directors, actors and actresses.

He spoke of the production done by the Guild and thanked all those who participated for their untiring efforts. The president thanked the outgoing executive for their splendid co-operation.

The nominating committee composed of Lillian Duchemin, Nellie Hughes with chairman Betty Large brought in the following list of executive members for the season 1965-66: president, M. A. D. Duff; vice-president, Merril Nicholson; secretary, Betty Holl; treasurer, Cathy Carmody; business manager, Paul Whelan.

Ronald Irving outlined the formation of a Community Theatre Alliance. The group would present a proposed season of

plays at the Confederation Centre Theatre, in which each of the leading theatre groups would present one production. Dates and plays would be chosen well beforehand and season's tickets sold. It was the feeling of those present that the Guild should join this Alliance, and give it whole-hearted support.

It was suggested that the Guild hold an early drive for membership and take out potential directors for the next season's activities.

A letter was read by Lillian Duchemin regarding a grant given by Canada Council to the Dominion Drama Festival Association, and how it was tentatively planned to have a professional director give a five to six week director's training program this fall in Charlottetown.

As many as possible of the members were asked to meet on Monday night, July 5th, to assist in the moving of properties from their present location at the old Spring Park School to the temporary headquarters obtained for them.

Club Will Open As Family Centre

Mr. MacKinnon said it is his intention to run the club as a recreation centre and it is hoped that entire families will take advantage of the facilities. He said it is also hoped that clubs for such sports as swimming, archery and horseshoe pitching will be formed.

Opening dance at the club is to be held tonight.

Earlier this week it was learned that a liquor license had been refused two Charlottetown businessmen who had planned to lease club facilities.

After the leasing arrangement fell through, Mr. MacKinnon decided that the club would go into operation, mainly as a family recreation centre and he indicated yesterday that there is a possibility that the club may stay open all year around.

Island Militia Units Winding Up Training

CAMP ALDERSHOT — Close to 200 officers and men of Island militia units were hard at work here this week, and complexions were changing rapidly as men underwent training in the field in hot, dry weather. Suntans and sunburns were the order of the day.

While preparations were being made for exercise "New Look" on Wednesday and Thursday, all three Island units — The Prince Edward Island Regiment, 5 Signal Regiment, and 6 Medical Company — carried on corps training. In addition, 22 members of the P.E.I. Regiment had carried on day-long rehearsals in the camp area.

Units attending camp here this week with the three Island units include 1st and 2nd Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders, with headquarters at Amherst and Sydney; 14 Field Regiment, from Yarmouth and Liverpool; and 6 Medical Company, from Halifax.

On Tuesday, the units were observed in training by the General Officer Commanding Eastern Command, Major-General Turcotte. The P.E.I. Regiment, picking up its old role of a reconnaissance regiment, gave a demonstration of recon tactics.

The 5 Signal Regiment was a busy engaged in setting up wireless equipment for the two-day exercise, while the recruits underwent training in setting up the communications and other facets of the wireless trade.

5 Medical Company, meanwhile, had an opportunity to see the operation of military hospitals first hand, as officers and other ranks spent Monday and Tuesday on a tour of military hospitals at HMCS Stadacona, HMCS Cornwallis, and RCAF Station Greenwood.

Exercise "New Look" on Wednesday and Thursday saw all units in camp moving some 100 miles out of this sprawling camp area near Kentville. All ranks spent the best part of two days in the field, with more than 400 troops and close to 100 vehicles taking part in the operation.

On Monday afternoon, Lt. Col. D. J. McCormack, militia adviser for P.E.I., arrived for a two-day stay in camp. He was accompanied by His Honor Lt. Col. W. J. MacDonald, who is honorary colonel of the P.E.I. Regiment. His Honor was assigned a tent in the officers' lines and "lived under canvas" with the rest of the troops.

Camp life of course is old hat for the Island's lieutenant-governor, who soldiered during the two World Wars, was a member of the militia in the years between the First and Second World Wars, and commanded the P.E.I. Highlanders during the Second War.

In spite of hard work and hot weather, this is a happy camp. The newest recruits have made a rapid adjustment to their new life, and good food, fellowship, and recreation programs more
