HAPPY, IGNORANT AND CONTENTED, THEY LIVE AS THEIR FATHERS LIVED.

The other day, while riding beyond Hatherly, in North Devon county, Western England, I saw one of these West of England farm laborers in the field, ploughing, writes a correspondent to the Kansas City Journal. I wanted information, not from books, but from its very source, the man himself. He did not show much curiosity when he saw me coming over the ploughed ground.

"Good morning," I said. "Mornin' you, zur," pulling his horse to a stop.

"What are you doing here? I asked. "Lor' zur, I be plowin'."

"What are you going to raise here? "Kaan't zactly za; master'ant toll I what he be plantin' here."

"I expect you are summer following the ground for fall wheat," I said. "I am a farmer myself."

"Lor," he ye that there? Wer'd y come from?" he asked for the first time showing surprise.

"I come from New York," I said. "Lor, wer'd be that there?"

"Why, over in America." "That be Muriky. You be trav'ler, be ye, you'd a come vrom vurein country? Acuse me, sir," he said, taking off his hat. "Ave'erd tell on yang Jan Dobs? He be out in Muriky, tu."

"What part of America?" I asked. "Ahd know. I year tell as he ware in the staats. Hed a leave ye'er its year acoome next Janewary."

"I don't think I've seen John Dobs," I said, and continuing, I asked him if he had been in London.

"London, Lor' no. I beano trav'ler, I does stop ome—bide my worrk."

"How much wages do you get a year?" I asked. "Ide ager fourteen shillings a week. I be general day laborer. "Arvestin' time I do get zaxpance or our atter zunzet, and master gies us all ze zider der want."

"How much do you lay up a year?" "Ahd no. Us don't save naught."

"Well, who'll take care of you in your old age?" I asked. "Ahd no. S'pose I gets odd jobs round farm."

"How many children have you?" "Lor, I a'got vive—dree byes and tu girls."

"What do your girls do?" "They both be out at survice."

"And your boys?" "Onder list yer soger. He be zar gent now. Tother tu be workin' out."

"Do you own any land?" "Lor, naw."

"Do you want any?" "Naw."

"What do you eat?" "Ait? Waul, bacon and budger's mate once a week—a Zundays."

"Do you drink?" "E, sure I do drink."

"What do you drink?" "Zider, beere, drop of gin—anything as coomes 'andy."

"How long has your family lived here?" "Doon know. Vaather, mother, grandvaather and grandame all be buried in you churchyard."

"What is your religious belief?" "Doan know," with a vacant stare.

"But you go to church sometimes, don't you?" "Es, I'de go to the parish church when I do clean myself."

"Do you believe in the Trinity?" "Never 'eard tell of him."

"Are there any Presbyterians here?" "What be them?"

"Are there any Methodists?" "Oh, they be a seore of um. They be bluddy rascals, too."

Alcohol as Medicine.

INTERESTING DISCUSSION BY THE DOCTORS.

At the recent meeting of the Medical Society of New Brunswick Dr. T. W. Musgrave read a paper on "The proper use of alcohol as a medicine, and the responsibility of physicians in prescribing it." He pointed out the effects of intemperance, which, he asserted, were largely the result of improper administration of liquor by physicians. He thought the time had come when a proper system of administering the drug should be devised. Liquor, he thought, should not be prescribed to persons in health, nor for chronic diseases or for fevers. Alcohol, he believed, should be taken as opium or any other drug. Moderate drinking, he declared, was both unscientific and criminal. He produced statistics to show the evil effects of the drug upon the human system.
