Of Special Interest to our Farmers

Cow's Feed at Calving Time.

Cows when expected to be fresh should not be allowed to have any grain for several weeks prior to calving, says The Epitomist. It is often the case where a farmer has an extra butter-producing cow that he overfeeds her at the critical time, or gives her such quality of grain in hopes of "making her do a little better next time," that she is liable to have milk fever or any one of the many other diseases that cause a speedy death. It is better to be on the safe side and not feed any grain until after she has been fresh at least three days, when a small ration can be safely given. There is no question but that a cow will make just as much butter in the long run when not fed grain until three or four days after dropping her calf as she will when stuffed before the lactation period begins; even if she would not, the risk is much less, and we prefer to be on the safe side, although it may seem a little slow sometimes.

The curse of New England has been too large farms. It is the curse of the whole country. It promotes slavery and waste. In France a farmer with eight acres of ground is counted a large farmer and is a capitalist of influence. It is not in the power of the man of average ability to superintend a one hundred or two hundred acre farm in a manner to keep it up and turn off crops every year perpetually as is done in portions of France, and all over China. The system of a large farm in New England has tended to bankrupt the soil, has sent her children away and insures a spare population.—Country Gentleman.

An exchange says: Very few farmers have enough stable manure to fertilize all their lands as they would like. The best thing for such farmers to do is to apply this stable manure mainly to the crops on which they expect to put the most of their labor. It does not pay to plant, cultivate and hoe poor land. Every addition of manure makes the labor more effective, and therefore more profitable. With mineral fertilizers it is different. These are usually applied to grain crops, for which dressing of 150 to 250 pounds per acre are usually sufficient for the crops, besides saving some to be taken by the clover after it. These mineral fertilizers so soon become insoluble in the soil that it does not pay to apply them in large amounts. A small quantity each year, sufficient to make the crop it is applied to, is much better.

Poultry Notes.

When the chicks keep crying and stand around refusing to eat, lice are bothering them or they have been chilled.

When the hens are busy scratching, laying and singing, and the cock almost continually crowing you may feel sure you have a healthy flock.

When the combs and wattles of the fowls are of a bright red it indicates a good healthy condition.

When fowls are rightly fed and made to exercise, and their quarters kept clean and free from lice, there is scarcely any trouble with disease.

When the beginner in the poultry business goes in for the best, and the best is the cheapest, and makes this his motto he has made a good step towards success.

Fowls that are well supplied with grit, charcoal and green food are seldom troubled with indigestion, liver troubles and kindred diseases.

Keep the insect powder going about the nest and over the broody hens to drive away the lice. You cannot get

a good hatch if the setter is troubled with lice and if allowed to remain they at once attack the young chicks.

When fowls are restless and keep constantly picking among their feathers look for lice. Dust the fowl well with insect powder and kerosene the roosts every two or three weeks in warm weather and you will keep them under control.—Co-operative Farmer.

New Food for Hens.

Saturday a gentleman stepped into this office and purchased one hundred or more old newspapers with which to feed his hens. He tears the paper into shreds and soaks it in sour milk until the whole mass becomes a pulp, when he feeds it to the hens, and he claims that it adds greatly to their egg-producing qualities. The newspaper is gradually extending its field of usefulness. From food for thought it has expanded until within its sphere is already included food for goats and hens.—Exchange.

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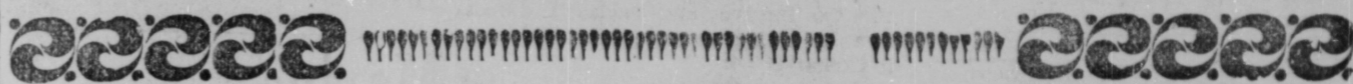
