New Four-Engine Transport Added To M.C.A. Fleet

A recently purchased four-engine York transport plane has been added to the fleet of the Maritime Central Airways, which has almost twice the wing span of the Douglas aircraft currently being used. Ten men accompanied the craft, which was purchased in England, five of whom are as crew and the remainder as passengers.

Reports Huge Gas Reserves In Alta.

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., July 20—(CP)—Premier E.C. Manning said here Friday night that Alberta has proven and estimated reserves of natural gas sufficient to supply demands of the provinces for 75 years.

Proven reserves would yield a 30-year supply, Mr. Manning said in a campaign address for the Aug. 5 Alberta general election.

The minimum rate of increase of proven reserves likely would be 1,000,000,000 cubic feet a year. This meant, he said, that in 10 years, when one-third of the present 30-year supply has been exhausted, there still would be enough natural gas for another 65 years.

re-elected for its third consecutive term but with a reduced majority. The Government won 68 of the 92 seats in the Legislature. In 1948, it won 72 seats. The Liberals won 23 seats compared with 8 in 1949.

The C.C.F. Government was re-elected in Saskatchewan with an increased majority. It won 42 seats and the Liberals 11 in a 53-seat Legislature. In 1948, the C. C. F. won 31 seats, the Liberals 19 and other 2.

When Premier Manning dissolved the Alberta Legislature June 28 the standing was: Social Credit 49; Liberals 3; C. C. F. 2; independent Social Credit, 3.

In New Brunswick at dissolution of the 52-seat Legislature, the Liberals held 46 seats and the Progressive Conservatives 5. The other was vacant.

In 1951 elections, Liberal governments were re-elected in Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. The Progressive Conservative Government of Ontario was re-elected with an increased majority.

“Angel In White” Fails To Make Peace Speech

HELSINKI, July 20—(AP)—The blonde "Angel in white" whose uncheduled 200-metre dash electrified the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games, was returned to West Germany today—her message of peace still not given to the world.

Dressed in black and carrying her Grecian white robe in a brown paper bag, the shapely, 23-year-old Miss was escorted to the airport by Finnish police and given a one-way ticket home.

Police were relieved. So were Olympic officials, chagrined at the bizarre touch handed their solemn inaugural program Saturday when the graceful girl leaped onto the track and trotted to the speakers' stand where she sought to make a speech to the 70,000 spectators.

Police identified her as Barbara Rotraut-Pleyer, a resident of Berlin and law student at the University of Tuebingen, near Stuttgart.

They called her a "fanatic peace idealist who insisted her sole motive was to get all the nations united."

A police psychiatrist, who examined the girl for two hours last night, said:

"She is just a mixed-up girl, a little ill in the mind. She is a religious as well as peace fanatic. She insisted her exhortation was not political."

Police closely guarded her and refused interviews but released these additional details from their talks with her:

She had planned the visit to the Olympics for weeks. She had worked out her schedule and program to the minutest detail, from the time she should arrive in Helsinki by way of Stockholm to the exact moment she should make her appearance in the vast stadium.

She had a speech prepared in both German and English. The text was not divulged, except that it involved a plea for united peace.

Indications Seen Moscow Looking For Korean Peace

The puppet mouthpiece for Soviet propaganda almost imperceptibly has shifted its tactics, indicating some tentative paving around in the works looking toward at least a temporary Korean peace.

The World Council of Peace, which long has carried the ball for Soviet propaganda ventures, has dropped its insistence on a five-power pact—including Red China—as a step toward international agreement.

The World Council calls instead for a four-power meeting on the unification of Germany. Its resolutions on the Far East—as published in the Soviet Press—call for an immediate end to the fighting in Korea, withdrawal of foreign troops, and withdrawal of Americans from Japan.

The impression is almost as if Korea now were a secondary matter in the mind of Moscow, with attention centring on the two biggest targets—Japan and Germany. The Council's various resolutions give much attention to both.

What apparently worries Moscow is the Japan eventually will be integrated in a Pacific bloc of countries in the same way Western Germany is being brought into the Atlantic bloc. The Russians undoubtedly are willing to go to great lengths to prevent such a development.

There still are clear indications that the grandstand play in the making. A Soviet-led, Soviet-inspired move toward armistice in Korea would be calculated to have a profound effect upon the rest of Asia, including Japan, even at the monetary expense of Communist China.
