

province, we presume, led to his withdrawal from here. During his peregrinations through the Provinces, the Doctor collected a large variety of curiosities, among which were some large bones, said to be of the Mastodon. This collection was purchased by the Directors of the Mechanics' Institute at St. John, for £1000, a pretty high price, according to the News.

For several years past we have hardly heard the lecturer's name mentioned, and regret, now that he has turned up, to find him attacking a portion of his countrymen for the education of a New York audience. The Doctor is probably not aware—or perhaps it did not suit the occasion to remember—that a large portion of the so-called American fishermen are men born and brought up in Nova Scotia. A great many of the smartest skippers out of the fishing ports of Cape Ann are natives of this Province.

Dr. Gesner is an old acquaintance with many of the people of this Island. In 1846 he was appointed to make a geological survey of the Colony—discovered and brought to Charlottetown a few stones, and some Indian roots, which he called Sagaban or wild potatoes—the former were deposited in the Legislative Library, where they may yet be seen—the latter, he persuaded many persons, were capable of cultivation as a substitute for the common potato; but the attempt at cultivation, if ever made, was speedily abandoned, for the thing has never been heard of since. The Doctor was pronounced and believed by many persons here to be a great humbug, but he got about four hundred pounds for his efforts in convincing our fellow Colonists of that fact.—En's Ex'r.

CATHOLIC YOUNG MEN'S LITERARY INSTITUTE.—On Thursday evening last, the 27th instant, Wm. Murphy, Esq., delivered his second lecture on "Respiration and Ventilation," before the above Institute. The learned gentleman's remarks on the paramount importance of ventilation on the health and happiness of mankind were listened to with marked attention by a large audience, among which were several scientific gentlemen of well known abilities. The lecturer deserves the best thanks of the Institute for the trouble and expense he incurred in manufacturing gases to illustrate and prove his statements. His experiments succeeded admirably, and tended to throw considerable light on the subject. After the lecture, an animated discussion ensued, during which the relative merits of various ventilators were expounded. It was generally admitted, however, that Dr. Arnott's, as being self-acting, offered the most advantages for general use. Some of the speakers having enunciated absurd and incorrect views in reference to ventilation, were promptly and ably rectified by the lecturer and other gentlemen well versed in the subject.

On Thursday evening next, the 3rd February, Mr. A. Begley will lecture on "Mechanism."
