

Policemen are being assassinated daily in New York. The Sun advocates a reform by changing the mode of selecting the judicial officers who are playing into the hands of the lawless—reasoning thus:—

The great obstacle in the way of this is the large influence which ruffians exercise in political affairs. This power is thoroughly understood by all candidates for popular favor. It is fully appreciated. Men who seek public office court the favor and support of the dangerous classes. Murderers understand very well that the place in which a friend is most valuable to them is on the bench; and they spare no effort to put and keep friends there.

Every record of the cold blooded murder of a faithful police officer is a fresh argument against our elective judiciary. We had better look this mischief squarely in the face and reform it.

NOVA SCOTIA.—On Friday last, the Attorney General of Nova Scotia tabled a lot of resolutions in the House of Assembly—to the effect that in proceeding with the business of the country, the Legislature did so under constraint from the Imperial Government. Under such circumstances, no action of the Legislature was to be taken as an acquiescence in Confederation, to which the Government and people are opposed. No compromise will be accepted, as repeal alone will satisfy them.

A SEA SERPENT at the EAST POINT.—A correspondent at Souris writes:—“Quite a sensation was caused last week amongst the boats of Chepstow by the appearance of a monster sea serpent. It appeared to be, as near as the fishermen could judge, 100 feet long. It made no attempt to molest the boats, but gave the men that saw it a great scare. It glided along quite leisurely, showing its head, which was a tremendous size.—There has not been any catches of mackerel made on the South side as yet.

THE work on St. Patrick's Hall, Charlottetown, (destined for the Christian Brothers' School,) which was suspended some time ago in consequence of a disappointment in the receipt of suitable brick from the United States, is again resumed, and is being vigorously prosecuted—a cargo of pressed brick having arrived from Portland on Saturday last.

Major General Charles Grahame Halplne, better known as “Miles O'Reilly,” a very gifted Irishman, died suddenly in New York, on the 17th inst. He wielded much influence over his countrymen in the Great Republic, where he had resided for the past twenty years. He was thirty-nine years old, and held at the time of his death, the honorable and remunerative position of Registrar for New York City.

SIR JOHN A. McDONALD'S Government has sustained a defeat in the constituency of West York, Ontario, vacant by the elevation of Hon. Mr. Howland to the Lieut. Governorship of that Province. Mr. Wright, the opposition candidate, was elected by a majority of 250 over the Ministerial nominee, Mr. Bell.

In compliance with a requisition to Sheriff Longworth, a County Meeting has been called for Friday next, in Market Hall, to take into consideration the subject of reciprocal free trade between this colony and the United States of America.—Chair to be taken at two o'clock, p. m.

A collision, the result of careless driving—between two horses and wagons, occurred at the crossing of Prince and Grafton streets, on Monday evening. The result was, that one of the wagons was knocked into smithereens, and the shaft of the other broken. Fortunately no one in the wagons was injured.

THE Dominion steamer Napoleon, having on board the distinguished party of Canadian visitors mentioned in our last issue, left for Quebec on Wednesday evening—having a very mean opinion of the courtesy and hospitality of Charlottetown. During their brief stay they were the guests of His Excellency Governor Dundas.

THE great Pacific Railway is now completed for over 800 miles, and will be finished and ready for traffic next year. A pleasure excursion from the Provinces to San Francisco will then be quite as common as a Fourth of July excursion to Boston is at the present time.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Dundas, and G. D. Atkinson, Esq., Private Secretary to His Excellency, started yesterday morning in the steamer Princess of Wales on a three-week's visit to Halifax.

WE have to acknowledge, from Peter McGowan, Esq., a statement of the City accounts up to the 1st January, 1868. We shall refer at length to this statement in our next number.

MR. KENNEDY, the Scottish vocalist, gave two entertainments to fair audiences in Market Hall this week—one on Monday night, and the other on Tuesday. We cannot speak too highly of the performances.

THE Paris boat and crew have maintained their reputation at a recent boat-race at Carleton, N. B., beating their competitors in a distance of four miles by two minutes.

THE Firemen of the City are going to hold the Picnic of the season at Southport to-morrow. As it is to be the last of the season, we have no doubt it will be well patronized.

A noted American politician, Thad. Stevens, departed this life at Washington on the 12th inst.

The fall of Humaita is considered a mere question of time, and the deserters state that Lopez has ordered its evacuation, and was preparing to dispute the passage of the River Tebiguary. The expeditionary force sent to pierce the enemy's country and reconnoitre the position of Lopez, had returned without achieving its object. A strong feeling prevails here amongst some parties against the alliance with Brazil. A terrific storm passed over the River Plate, causing much damage.

A NEW DUKEDOM.—The present Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, the Marquis of Abercorn, is to be made a Duke, under the title of the Duke of Abercorn. Ducal honors are rarely conferred in England. The last man upon whom the honor was conferred was Lord Wellington, who was made a Duke in 1814, for his achievements in the Peninsula war. The Marquis of Abercorn, James Hamilton, K. G., P. C., is the eldest son of the late Viscount Hamilton.

The United Service Gazette states that it is currently reported that Mr. Byre will be the next Governor of the Dominion of Canada. There are about six noblemen and gentlemen, each of whom the London papers declare is to be the next representative of the Sovereign in this country.

The President of the United States has directed the Secretary of War to withdraw all the military from those of the Southern States which have representatives in congress. Thus has civil government been restored, and the despotism of military power been abolished.

It is reported that the northern Damos had taken possession of Yeddo. The party of the Mikado were acting with great vigour and had mustered a large army to meet the rebel forces.

It was rumored that three distinguished jurists—Sir W. Pagewood, Justice Selwyn and Sir Fitzroy Kelley—were to be raised to the British peerage.

Governor Stoverson, Democratic, of Kentucky, has been elected by a majority little short of 90,000. So says the Boston Post.

His Grace the Archbishop, who has been engaged for the past six weeks in the visitation of his diocese in the Western counties, is expected home this week.—H. E.

The Paris Liberte says Dr. Pusey, of England, has become a convert to Catholicism.
