GOMEZ SUSPENDED

Fines Follow Baseball Melee

MILWAUKEE (AP) — One of the wildest melees of the current National League season resulted Wednesday in a \$250 fine for pitcher Ruben Gomez of the New York Giants, a \$100 fine for first baseman Joe Adcock of the Milwaukee Braves and a three-day suspension for Gomez.

The Puerto Rican righthander touched off a fracas involving players of both teams in the second inning of Tuesday night's game at County Stadium when he pitched a ball and once with a de- liberately thrown ball. YARMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Mary Ellen Driscoll, smooth swinging powerhouse from Saint John, B. Wednesday won the Nova Scotia ladies golf title with a hand- stroke lead over runner-up Barbara Trites of Bridgewater, N.S. Miss Driscoll finished with a 47, while Miss Trites had 272. Rita Lohnes, the defending champion from Lunenburg, was way off her game for the third successive day and finished with a 54-hole total of 276.

Cliff Lumsden Winner Of 25-Mile Atlantic City Swim

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (CP)—Toronto marathoner Cliff Lumsden Wednesday won Atlantic City's 25-mile world championship swim, beating defending champion Tom Park by half a stroke.

Lumsden ended a runner-up finish in edging to victory over the Canadian-turned-Californian who had won the two previous swims. However, Park's record of nine hours, 21 minutes and 42 seconds stands. Lumsden, who picks up \$4,500, was timed in nine hours and 51 minutes while Park's time was 9:51:00.2.

First contestant across the finish line was Greta Anderson, an Olympic swimmer. She was the Danish girl, as did the rest of the female contestants, started half an hour before the men. She took the women's first prize of \$1,500. Miss Anderson's elapsed time was 10 hours and 17 minutes.

Lowly Detroit Tigers broke the New York Yankees 11-game win- ning streak Wednesday, taking both ends of a doubleheader 8-4 and 4-3 despite Mickey Mantle's 31st home run.

In other afternoon games Bos- ton defeated Kansas City 7-4 while in the National League Philadel- phia Phillies took their first doubleheader sweep of the season in defeating Chicago Cubs 6-4 and 6-1.

Al Kaline's homer off Mickey McDermott broke a 3-3 tie in the sixth inning of the second game after the Tigers climbed Tom Sturdivant and Don Larsen for 12 hits in the opener. Kaline also saved the day with a leaping catch on Mantle with two on base in the ninth inning of the second game.

Anita at first refused to leave and argued heatedly for five min- utes. Meanwhile, Marilyn Bell of Tor- onto, in training for an attempt at the 18.3 miles separating Van- couver Island from the Washing- ton state coast, got a mild taste of what's in store for her.

She ran into a two-mile-an-hour rip tide and then had to plough through several swift eddies.
