HON. EDWARD BLAKE,

Opinion in Ireland and England

As to his Intimation that he will Return
 to Canadian Politics.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—The Star's Lon-
 don cable says: "Much doubt is thrown
 in Irish circles upon the interpretation put
 upon Mr. Blake's Strathroy speech to the
 effect that he intended retiring from Irish
 politics.

Timothy Healy's Dublin journal throws
 its cap in the air over the supposed deser-
 tion.

John Dillon says that the rats are leaving
 the sinking ship.

Dillon's journals make no comment, but
 it is understood in Irish circles here that
 Mr. Blake merely referred to his long-
 cherished hopes to again ultimately live in
 Canada. It is not thought that he can
 intend to retire immediately, leaving the
 Irish ranks in the middle of a battle and
 on the eve of an important crisis in the
 legislation before parliament. His retire-
 ment would be a heavy blow to Mr. Dillon.

GREAT STORM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Losses of Life and Property at
 Sea.

Bodies Washed Ashore.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Scarcely a town on
 the coast of Great Britain escaped yester-
 day's gale. Stories of thrilling escapes
 come from all points.

On the Norfolk coast between Boston
 and Happisburg, five vessels, as yet un-
 identified, went down and the crews of all
 perished. A number of bodies have been
 washed ashore near Yarmouth.

GREAT COAL CONTRACT.

800,000 Tons a Year for Twenty
 Years.

HALIFAX, Nov. 30.—A Montreal des-
 patch says that the New England Gas
 Company has signed a contract with the
 Dominion Coal Company for the delivery
 of 800,000 tons of coal yearly in Boston.
 The contract is said to be for twenty years.

FOUND DEAD.

Owen Hamill, of Point Du Chene

MONTON, Nov. 29.—Owen Hamill, aged
 50 years, was found dead in a box car used
 as a coal shed at Point Du Chene. An
 inquest was held and a verdict of accident-
 al death returned.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

Bye-Elections by Acclamation.

Abolition of Offices and Extensive
 Savings.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 30.—Yesterday
 was nomination day for the bye-elections.
 The Government candidates were returned
 by acclamation, as follows: From Bruin,
 Sir James Winter; Bonavista, A. B.
 Morine; Fogo, I. C. Duder; Harbor Main,
 W. Woodford.

The Government has retired collector of
 customs Noonan and appointed D. Leha-
 saureir collector in his stead.

They have also dismissed nineteen clerks
 and a side watter in the customs service of
 St. John's, saving \$15,000 in yearly
 salaries.

They have also dismissed the sheriffs of
 the Northern Districts, saving \$3,000
 yearly. These offices are abolished.

After the commission finishes its investi-
 gation of all the services in this city, they
 will commence operations over the balance
 of the Colony.

ARCHBISHOP CLEARY.

He, This Time, Pays His Respects to
 Critics—Some Strong Talk From His
 Grace of Kingston.

(Special to the Montreal Star.)

KINGSTON, Ont., November 26.—Thurs-
 day was the seventeenth anniversary of the
 consecration of Archbishop Cleary, and the
 priests of the Diocese presented him with
 an address, in which reference was made to
 the recent mandate on Protestant marriages.
 His words were, of course, endorsed.

In replying the Archbishop referred to
 the recent discussion on the mandate as a
 "little tempest of anti-Christian
 scribes and pharisees."

He and his people had good reason to
 feel happy in witnessing the preternatural
 fury of the agents of Satan, which had
 ever been a true indication, always verified
 in the results, that the spite and malice
 and storming anger of the Evil One had
 not been stirred up by any trifling cause,
 but by some great and grand success of
 the church in baffling His Sable Majesty's
 policy, to ruin religion and damnation to
 the souls of men.

He illustrated this proposition by his-
 torical references from olden and modern
 times; and hereupon he directed attention
 to the fact that the arch-enemy and his
 associates invariably singled out some one
 Bishop or Archbishop or patriarch for
 their most determined malignity, and pur-
 sued and persecuted him; and moved im-
 perial forces and judges and lawyers and
 scribes to hunt him down or drive him
 into exile or death.

Hence he (the Bishop) felt himself hon-
 ored by the recent outburst of hellish
 spite and lying, directed primarily against
 Christ and his Holy Church and His
 doctrines of saving truth and divine wor-
 ship; but most markedly, although, second-
 arily, against himself, of whom more lies
 and slander had been printed and pub-
 lished a few weeks ago than had ever
 been flung against any prelate at any pre-
 vious time in any country in the world.

Of this he was legitimately proud; in fact
 he rejoiced, and was more happy day after
 day, as the anti-Christian newspaper breeze
 grew louder and stronger. He said it was
 good for the church, and "would exalt our
 religion in the minds of all upright men."
 One consideration alone detracted from
 his pleasure. It was the disgrace and
 shame these worthless scribes of the no-
 Popery press were bringing on the fair
 name of our province.

Strangers who came to Ontario at that
 time could not suppress their indignation
 and disgust, and often the question was
 asked "How can any decent man live in
 this fashion? Is this after all the darkest
 Africa, the land of the Zulus and Ashan-
 tees?"

Amongst those two dozen anti-Christian
 scribes, it is safe to say there is not one
 truthful or honorable man, not one, edu-
 cated man, not one who could prove
 himself to be a gentleman. Taken
 altogether they are the vilest gang on this
 western continent, the shame of Ontario.
 I stand before you as the most abused
 Archbishop in Ontario. I rejoice in it.
 I glory in it. Those abominably wicked
 men of the no-Popery press have no other
 way of complimenting me, and
 marking me out for honorable distinction
 than vilifying and slandering me and the
 Holy Church whose doctrine I officially
 propound. They well know their adula-
 tion would be scornfully rejected.

They know equally well that their
 praise would be the grossest insult that
 could be offered to any prelate of God's
 Church.

An Ottawa despatch of the 28th reports
 that the Halifax deputation had only three
 hours' stay in that city, but utilized every
 moment of the time to good advantage.
 They proceeded direct from the station to
 Hon. Dr. Borden's office, where they had a
 conference on the particular matter which
 brought them to Ottawa, after which ac-
 companied by the minister of militia, they
 interviewed Hon. Mr. Blair. The Halifax
 contention in favour of the same freight
 rates as St. John was pressed by Mayor
 Stephen, B. Russell, M. P., and others.
 The upshot was that after thoroughly
 thrashing the matter out, Hon. Mr. Blair
 was disposed to consider the point, al-
 though not giving a definite promise until
 he had seen Mr. Harris, in whose hands
 the matter lies. The deputation went away
 satisfied that the Halifax request would be
 granted. Hon. Mr. Blair left for Perry
 Sound last night, to return Tuesday.
