## The British Elections!

Conservatives to Coalesce with Home-Rulers.

## Bismarck Tenders His Resignation to the German Emperor!!

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, April 7.

As an indication of the impression created by Sir Leonard's speech, Mr. Ross, M. P., a strong opponent, said in the course of a speech at the meeting of the Dominion Temperance Alliance last evening, that he has listened to-night to one of the ablest speeches on the National Policy that he had ever heard from Sir Leonard. Between the Toronto Globe article on the Canada Pacific Railway, and Sir Leonard's speech on the National Policy, the Opposition have a fit of the blues.

Monday will be taken as a Government day in the Commons for the remainder of the session.

It is understood that the Ministerial caucus yesterday was considering the Banking Bill.

The Supreme Court holds a special sitting on the 9th of April, when judgments on the Temperance Act and Selkirk election trial will be delivered.

Mrs. Mills, wife of ex-Minister Mills, is dangerously ill.

LONDON, April 7.

The "Daily News" hints that the Conservatives will coalesce with the Home Rulers in order to defeat the Liberal Administration.

The net gain of the Liberals is now 65 seats.

CABUL, April 7.

Mustafi Habibulla Khan will return to Mardan to-day with a reassuring message for Ghuznee chiefs. He expects to return to Cabul with them.

VIENNA, April 7.

The Governor-General of East Siberia has telegraphed that they are not Chinese troops, but Irregular Tartars, who invaded Russian territory. They attempted to cross the Amoor River, but were unsuccessful.

BERLIN, April 7.

The Bundesrath has passed the Stamp Law, with certain modifications. They were not agreeable to Bismarck and he sent his resignation to the Emperor, who refused to accept it, using the words "never." Bismarck again sent his resignation, saying that the vote on the Bundesrath was not the sole grounds for his action, but that his health was such that he considers it necessary to withdraw from public life.

Bismarck will confer with the Emperor to-day.

The popular opinion is that he will remain in office.
