Will Be First Lady On Canadian Bisley Team

Miss Mary MacLennan of Alexandria, P.E.I., will be the first lady marksman to be a member of Canada's rifle team at the Bisley Shoot in England when they compete there next July.

Miss MacLennan, who competed against 600 Dominion marksmen at Ottawa last August in the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association meeting, placed 10th, in the Bisley Aggregate that determined the 18-man team that would represent Canada in the 1951 rifle classic.

Posting a score of 732 in the D.C.R.A. last August to qualify for the Bisley team, Miss MacLennan was not listed as one of the 18 members of the team at that time due to the fact that no formation was open to lady competitors, other than Nursing Sisters attached to the Armed Services.

As a member of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, however, confirmation was received here yesterday by Brigadier W.W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D., that Miss MacLennan will be eligible to compete with Canada's Bisley Team. Her participation on the team will make two representatives from this Province on this year's team, the other being Sergeant G.A. Coles of Summerside, who also qualified in the Bisley Aggregate of the D.C.R.A. competitions last August.

Miss MacLennan, who is a school teacher by profession and is presently engaged on the teaching staff at West Kent School, took up rifle shooting in 1954 and has competed in every Provincial Rifle Association Shoot since that time and has been outstanding in her performance in many of them. She was a member of the Red

Cross Corps during the last war and also instructed members of the West Kent School Cadet Corps in rifle shooting during that time. Miss MacLennan's accomplishments as an outstanding rifle shot comes naturally, as the member of a prominent family of marksmen. Her brother, Sergeant George G. MacLennan, was a member of Canada's Bisley team in 1928, and is at present the P.R.A. champion, while their late father was an outstanding marksman in past years in Provincial and other competitions.

Miss MacLennan is also very fond of many outdoor sports including hunting and has taken up curling for the first time this season to add to her many other accomplishments.

Beavers To Clash With Islanders Here Tonight

The two big winners of last night's Maritime Senior Hockey League contests, Charlottetown Islanders and Saint John Beavers, will be the opponents who will clash over Forum ice here tonight in a regular Big Four fixture scheduled for 8:30.

Always a threat when they clash with Islanders and have won more games over the league leaders than any other club in the circuit, the Beavers can be expected to make it another roaring, close contest here tonight.

In their last two meetings, Saint John scored a 6-5 victory over Islanders here on Jan. 24th, and at the Windy City on Monday the two clubs battled to an overtime 3-3 deadlock.

That should make tonight's encounter one for local fans to look forward to, and those who will be on hand for the contest can be assured they will see plenty in the way of fast, wide open hockey and exciting action.

The final section of the schedule will comprise a total of 19 games, including all unplayed games of the first section, and will see the final matches concluded on March 10th, ready to launch into semi-final playoff competition. The four top teams will be eligible for the playoffs, while the two cellar squads of the six-team loop will be dropped at the conclusion of the regular schedule.

The semi-finals will be home and home, total score affairs, with the team placing first in the regular schedule meeting the fourth place team in one division and the second and third place teams making up the other semi-final group. The finals will be decided at a later date after the two semi-finals winners have been decided.

At the end of the first section, Saint Dunstan's are leading the loop with no defeats in four starts for a perfect score so far, while last year's champions, R.C.A.F. Flyers are running them a close second with three wins and a loss. Prince of Wales are deadlocked in a third place tie with Y.M.C.A. with two victories each, while Ray's Millionaires and Schurman's are sharing the cellar position with no wins to date. Ray's have made four starts and Schurman's two.

Andrews, garnered one for Milton earlier in the night, was the leading goaltender for Milton while Reg Coles picked up their other marker. Sharpshooters for Monarchs were Hurry and Burke who collected a tally each.

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Come From Behind In Second Period

HALIFAX, Feb. 9 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's blew a three-goal second period lead to Charlottetown Islanders and the Maritime Major Hockey League leaders came up with a 6-4 victory here tonight.

Saints skating fast in the first 20 minutes, built up a 2-0 lead and at the halfway mark had increased it to 4-1. Then they stopped skating and when the period closed, Islanders were leading 5-4.

It was all they needed. In the third, they allowed Saints to carry the play and with a top performance from Hal Gordon in the Island cage, they threw off the desperate attacks of the local club. Islanders shot the puck into an empty net late in the third when coach Sweeney Schriener pulled D'Aoust for a power play.

It was a good game in the first two periods with lots of action and some smartly executed goals. In the opening chapter, Saints skated all over Islanders and brought joy to the hearts of their fans with their display. They continued their top work for the first half of the middle frame then bogged down.

A pair of penalties in quick succession to Eddie Brown started Saints on the downgrade. The first was strictly from referee Bradshaw's own book, but it gave Islanders a man advantage and they capitalized. Hardly had he returned to the ice when he was chased again and once more the Charlottetown team came through. Before the period ended, they battled in another pair and that was the game.

Saints threw attack after attack in the Island cage in the third and fired 17 shots at Hal Gordon but they failed to find any

holes.

Beavers Down Hawks 10-3 In Game Last Night

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 8 (CP)—Third place Saint John Beavers increased their already wide lead over Moncton Hawks, in the cellar of the four-team Maritime Major Hockey League, by burying the luckless Birds under a 10-3 score tonight.

Jack Thaler performed the hat trick for Beavers and assisted on two other goals. Ted Watson shot a brace. Other Beaver scorers were Larry Blackburn, Buck Whitlock, Nick Nicolle, Roger Jodoin, and Paul Platz. The successful Moncton marksmen were Marcel Bessette, Gordon Miller and Mousie Dowling.

The teams started on even terms, the first period ending 3-2 in favor of Saint John. Beavers fired two in the second against one for Moncton and ran wild with five more in the third.

Influenced had an effect on the game. Les Colvin, Moncton's regular goalie, and Tommy Brennan, Saint John centre, were on the sick list. Referee Stan Swain went through two periods before a doctor ordered him to bed. Neil Sanford officiated alone in the last canto.

Fred Sonier, subbing for Colvin, made 29 saves. The Saint John defenseman, Dennis Brodeur, stopped 18.

Moncton opened the scoring when Bessette soloed with no one in front of him except Brodeur, who had little chance on the shot. Saint John goals by Watson, Blackburn and Whitlock followed as a result of combination plays. Bessette helped Miller to end the period scoring.

Dowling's screened backhander early in the second finished the tallies for Moncton. A long shot by Thaler bounced off Sonier's pads into the net, and the same scorer counted five minutes later with a slapshot from a scramble inside the blue line.

Saint John's five goals in the wide open third period were tallied by as many different players. Calling of only one penalty—a minor to Nicolle in the second—constituted a record for the rugged Maritime Major League.
