## Lobster Season Will Open May 1

The 1962 lobster fishing season will start May 1 as scheduled, Hon. Angus MacLean, federal minister of fisheries said yesterday as he denied a request by the P.E.I. Fisheries Federation for a one week's postponement.

Hon. Mr. MacLean explained that in order to grant the request he would have to make the order applicable to the entire District 7 B which embraces Maritime shores from the dividing line with District 8 at Victoria, then around the island to North Cape.

It includes that fishing area of northern New Brunswick from Northumberland County to Restigouche County where fishing conditions are reported good and where in fact he had a previous request for an earlier opening.

**NO N.S. — N.B. REQUEST**  
 The Minister said inasmuch as the fishermen in neither Nova Scotia nor New Brunswick supported the request he was unable to comply with it.

He noted that though there was some ice in evidence, the con-

### Court Dismisses Exposure Case

SUMMERIDE — Charges of indecent exposure against Gilbert Thibeau, Kensington, and Roy Rogers, Indian River, were dismissed in police court yesterday by Magistrate R. S. Hinton Q.C. at the conclusion of evidence.

The two men were charged as the result of an incident at the Legion home Summerside last Saturday night.

In dismissing the charge Magistrate Hinton said there must be intent to wilfully commit an act of indecent exposure, and although "I feel the accused are not telling the whole truth" there is not conclusive evidence to convict in this case under the criminal code.
