

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FOR GOODS A SPECIALTY.—Beer Brew I. O. O. F.—Widely Lodge tonight. Third degree, and brother B. Bremner reports on Sovereign Grand Lodge meeting.

PHARMACIAN HALL.—Tonight the Gospel Temperance Subject will be a burning question. "Who art thou?" and "Who art thy brother?" All are cordially invited.

A SNAP FOR THE LAWYERS.—Eight lawyers are engaged in the Keilior estate in the probate court at Dorchester, N. B. The estate is valued at \$50,000.

THE MARKET.—The market was fairly well attended to-day, with the supply about as usual. Prices remained the same except eggs, which have advanced to from 12 to 14 cts. per doz.

FOOTBALL.—At Halifax, on Wednesday, Dalhousie won from the Navy, the score being 29 to 3. Although the game was somewhat lopsided, an interesting exhibition was furnished.

NO SHOW THIS YEAR.—It is announced that there will be no show in connection with the Moncton and Covert agricultural society this year. The society has not, however, lost sight of the permanent exhibition building project.

ATE HIS WAY TO LIBERTY.—For stealing a loaf of bread from a bakery, Mayor Nichols, of Wilkes-Barre, Penn., recently sentenced 10-year-old Jacob Ruff to the lock-up until he ate the loaf. The old man ate his way to liberty in four hours.

FOR BARBADOS.—The schooner Neva, Capt Taylor, left today for Barbados with a cargo of oats and potatoes under deck and 28 horses and 4 cows on deck. The cargo is owned for the most part, by George Toombs and Alex Home of this city.

POXY SOLD.—Miss Bertie Brown, daughter of Mr. P. S. Brown, of this city, sold her handsome pony, Minnie Pilot, to Mr. Jenkins, of Boston, for a snug sum. The pony will be shipped in the Florida this evening. The sale was made through Mr. John Cairns, of Charlottetown.

AT THE BETS.—The third match for the Colchester gold medal was shot at Kensington Range yesterday afternoon. Sergt. M. Davidson led with 81 points, and Capt. Henry Hooper was second with 78 points. The remaining two matches will not be shot till next season.

UNANSWERED CALL.—We hear that a unanimous call has been given to the Rev. A. A. McKENZIE, of Brookfield and New Glasgow, by the Presbytery of the Church of St. Stephen, N. B., and that the congregation have engaged to raise the stipend from \$900, the amount they have been paying hitherto, to \$1,000.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, Angus Duffach, confessed to a first violation of the Canada Temperance Act and was fined \$50 and \$200 costs or two months imprisonment. Michael Madden was fined \$12 and 60 days hard labor for being drunk and disorderly, and John Cummings for being drunk and incapable was fined \$5 or 40 days.

FIRE AT WELLINGTON.—The Summer side correspondent of the Guardian reports that the dwelling house and barn of Mrs. Abram Noonan, on the Western Road, at Wellington, were destroyed by fire on Wednesday morning. All the hay and grain in the barn were destroyed. A mowing machine, reaper and buggy were saved. There was no insurance.

A TELEPHONE IMPROVEMENT.—There are now two hundred wires leading into the Charlottetown Telephone office. These are forthwith to be merged into four insulated cables of fifty wires each, enclosed in lead pipes. This improvement will cost the Telephone Company a considerable sum of money. It will extend only to the wires in the neighborhood of the exchange.

LET US TAKE MONEY.—Jasper T. White, of Sycamore township, O., recently sold a farm for \$12,000. He hid the money, cash and notes, in an unused chimney, not telling his wife of the hiding place. On Tuesday she had a number of visitors and made a fire in the bedroom where the money was hidden. The whole amount was burned up. The couple have another farm left.

Mr. D. Bennie Laird, of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Summerside, was at the meeting.

THAT A FAKE RACE.—It will be remembered that Laidlaw, of Dartmouth, and Dowd of Montreal, had a skating race last year. One Baker sued Wambolt for \$200 to let him bet on the race. It was proved that the race was not a genuine contest. Judge Johnstone at Halifax on Tuesday decided that Baker was entitled to recover the \$200 bet, as such transactions were not defined by statute as gambling, even if the race should be a fake.

ANOTHER NEW PAPER.—The Union Journal in the name of a paper recently started in East Boston, the first number of which has been received by THE EXAMINER. Clarence M. Chase is proprietor and publisher. It is announced editorially that the Union Journal is "devoted to the interest of law and order, sobriety, integrity and good citizenship in general." It has correspondents in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island.

Stanfield and Miss Nellie returned on Friday evening from a visit to Charlottetown and Summerside, P. E. Island.—T. R. S. President Schurman's trip to England this summer resulted in the resignation from Cambridge University of one of the most talented and prominent of the younger school of scholars and historical writers who are carrying on the splendid traditions of the Oxford school, headed by the late Professor Freeman, Bishop Stubbs and Golden Smith. The name of the young professor is H. Morse Stephens, and he has left Cambridge to accept the acting professorship of modern European history at Cornell.

NEARLY DONE.—The number of electors who yesterday evening and to-day made application to be registered has far exceeded the expectation of the party managers. A large number from the country districts have been in to-day, besides quite a number from Charlottetown, so that the probabilities are that before the rooms close tomorrow evening, not many unregistered electors will be found. This is right, but there should be none left unregistered.

A HANDSOME CRAFT.—During their spare time this summer Messrs. Lennell and Henry Winchester, of this city, built a sail boat which was launched a few days ago. The boat is handsomely modelled, and is 16 feet long by 4 feet 6 inches beam. She is built of cedar and white oak which was imported from Boston, and is finished in a rich color. The planks are all in one piece from stem to stern, which adds greatly to the strength of the boat. We wish the Messrs. Winchester success with their new boat.

THE FLORIDA-ELFIN COLLISION.—The Government to-day attached the steamer Florida. This afternoon, Messrs. John Ings and W. W. Clarke went security for the steamer, and she will leave for Boston at the usual time. Mr. Davies, Q. C., is looking after the interests of Mr. Plant, and Attorney-General Peters is acting for the Government. The damage to the Elfin is temporarily placed at \$2,500; the full extent of the damage will not be known till the steamer has been placed in the dry dock. The damage to the wharf is placed at \$500. The total amount of the damage to the wharf and Florida was attached is \$3,000. Captain Hall, of the Florida, says that on the night of the collision he had no idea his steamer was so near the ferry wharf; in fact, he could not see the wharf, there was so little light. The Florida was leaving the Steam Navigation Co's wharf stem foremost, and there was a schooner lying right in her way. While trying to avoid running into this schooner, the steamer's lead swung round and it was then the accident occurred. The line was not slipped from the Florida, as was thought, but ran off the chalk.

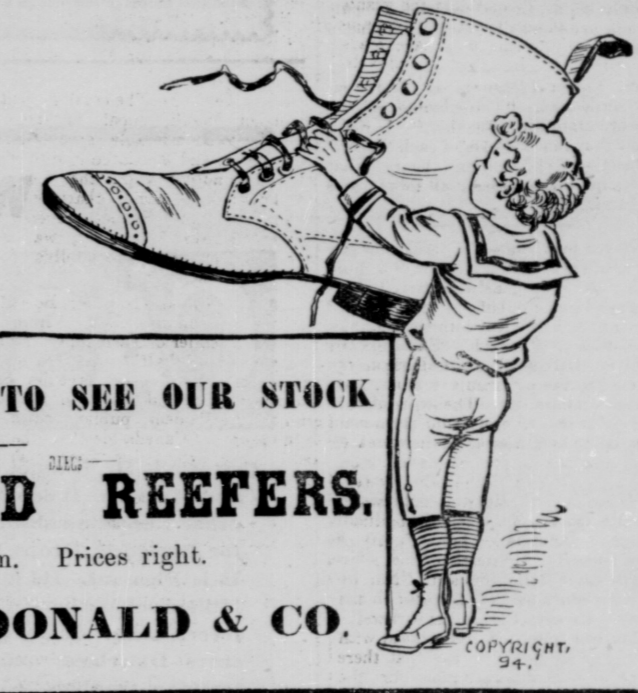
