SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 27.

There is a good prospect of Canada being represented at the annual meeting of the National Rifle Association of the United States at Creedmoor, this year, the executive committee having decided to allow the use of the Martini Henri in competition restricted to military rifle.

The new department of the Geological Survey comes into operation on July 1st. Dr. Selwyn, Director, will be deputy head. Hon. Mr. Dandridge will then be head of three departments.

New regulations regarding the qualifications of steamboat engineers will be gazetted to-morrow.

An order in council has been passed by which the Government undertake to operate five miles of railway, from Port Mulgrave to Terminal City, as part of the Intercolonial system.

Further crop reports from the Northwest are of a most satisfactory character.

Hon. J. Arsenault, of P. E. I., is here to-day on departmental business.

The Halifax-Bermuda Cable.

HALIFAX, June 27.

The work of laying the Halifax and Bermuda cable is being most successfully carried out. Yesterday at 9 o'clock 110 miles had been laid, and this morning at the same hour connection was made with the ship from the quarters at the lumber yard. A message from the Westmeath announced that she was now 240 miles from Halifax, and that 250 miles of cable had been laid. The weather continues moderate, with light south-west winds. If the weather keeps fine the work of laying the cable from Halifax to Bermuda will be accomplished by Monday evening or Tuesday morning. There are now about 492 miles to be laid.

Dixon Wins.

LONDON, June 27.

The international glove fight between George Dixon, the colored bantam weight champion of America, and Nunce Wallace, bantam weight champion of England, took place at the Pelican Club this evening. The match was for the bantam weight championship of the world and a purse of £500. Wallace retired in the nineteenth round and Dixon was declared the victor. The fight was witnessed by about 1000 persons.

Yale Wins.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 27.

The fifteenth annual four miles straight-away eight-oared boat race between Yale and Harvard Universities crews, was rowed this evening over the Thames river course, from Gale's Ferry to Winthrop Point, Yale winning by three and a half lengths in 21:29.

College Changes.

HALIFAX, June 27.

It is rumored that Prof. J. G. McGregor, of Dalhousie, is to be appointed to the chair of physics in McGill College, Montreal. Graham Creelman, who has been having honor courses abroad, is spoken of as Prof. McGregor's successor.

Strike Ended.

CHICAGO, June 27.

At the conclusion of the meeting this afternoon, of the railroad strikers they announced they had decided to accept the concessions of the companies. At 4:20 all suburban trains were running as usual.

WASHINGTON, June 27.

The Senate has passed the bill for the admission of Wyoming as a state by a strict party vote.

The President has approved the dependent pension bill.
