Inspector A. S. McNeil, commanding officer, "I" division, RCMP, last night reported that the Quebec detachment was engaged in investigating an alleged shooting which is reported to have occurred in the vicinity of or near French Creek.

Lower Montague resident, Robert Ross is reported to have been struck in the leg with a number of shot pellets, which required treatment in the hospital at Montague.

Insp. McNeil said that up until now no charges have been laid against anyone.

Social Creditor Makes Apology

OTTAWA (CP)—Social Creditor Bernard Dumont apologized in the Commons today to Speaker Marcel Lambert for his criticism of the Commons chamber.

The French speaking MP for Bellechasse constituency, a freshman member of the Commons, said he did not know it was contrary to the rules to criticize the Speaker publicly outside the Commons chamber.

He added that he was sorry for anything offensive he had written and expressed hope that Speaker Lambert would continue to be objective.

It appeared likely that Mr. Dumont's public apology today would soften any action taken by the Commons chamber, which has wide powers of recommending disciplinary action.

Earlier in the Commons, Dumont was expelled from the Commons for a part of a day for refusing to obey an order of the Speaker.

Cuban Exiles Are Arrested

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Ten heavily armed Cuban exiles were arrested aboard an unmarked cabin cruiser Wednesday by U.S. customs agents.

Joseph Fortier, supervising customs agent, said the 10 men were cruising down the Miami River toward Biscayne Bay aboard a 32-foot cabin cruiser which bore no registry, number or name.

"We apparently didn't want the boat identified," Fortier said.

Fortier said the men, riding quite low in the water under an apparently heavy load, were carrying rifles and pistols. They had carbines and binoculars.

The 10 were lodged in jail, where customs agents questioned them.

Fortier said the men told him they were members of the Second National Embassy Front, an anti-Castro group active in the group's underground in Cuba. They were charged with illegal export of arms in violation of the American Neutrality Act.

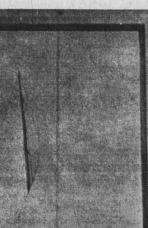

Weldon Charras Three Years Wanted

1959 Persons harboring or assisting in the escape of a criminal under the Criminal Code.

The slight, 42-year-old Hong Kong Chinese sought by the RCMP has successfully eluded the RCMP, Immigration and Customs officers and other police forces for three years.

But the doubtful fact is that Weldon Charras, 2, 1959. That was the day before he, and his wife and his then six-year-old daughter, Arie, were to be sent to the British Crown colony by ship from Seattle, Wash.

An RCMP official said Charras may still be in Canada. However, there also was a possibility that he had slipped across the border into the United States and might be in Seattle or San Francisco, which have large Chinese populations.

Charras' wife and daughter are living in Vancouver. Mrs. Charras works in a restaurant and the daughter is attending a private Roman Catholic school.

The deportation order against Charras and his family was issued on grounds that he was in Canada illegally. The family arrived in Vancouver in April, 1959, on visitors' visas and in October of that year sought permission to enter Canada as immigrants.

Canada Plans World Fair On Centennial

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is "99 per cent sure" of being host to the 1967 World's Fair, Minister Pierre Severyn said Friday.

Mr. Severyn, who Thursday was designated by the cabinet, minister responsible for the proposed Montreal fair, told a press conference he did not intend to sell the pet before the bear is shot" but was convinced Ottawa's bid application was approved by the International Bureau of World Fairs at a meeting in Paris Friday.

Meeting here Friday with Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal and Andre Rousseau, Quebec minister of commerce and industry, Mr. Severyn said the fair would be an immense step forward for Canada both culturally and economically.

The unit will place upon an old 12-pounder artillery piece mounted on a monument on Biggin Street just south of Confederation Square.

This same gun was saved from enemy capture by the charge of the Royal Canadian Dragoons in a bitter action in which three Canadians won Victoria Crosses, highest Commonwealth medals for valor in action.

A group of soldiers from the modern-day Royal Canadian Dragoons, now based at Camp Gagetown, N.B., will also be in the band.

Buffalo Park Has Flooding

OTTAWA (CP)—Serious flooding in Wood Buffalo National Park has created a herding problem for the park's bison. The water has caused the bison to migrate southward, and a new party founded after the campaign began in the last week of September, l'Action Provinciale, had 11 candidates campaigning on an anti-expropriation platform.

There
