She soon regained her equanimity, and was as sane as ever.

Should duty be re-imposed on Canadian fish products in the United States markets, as provided for in the Fisheries Bill reported to Congress, there will be exactly \$2 per bbl on mackerel, \$1 on herrings, \$1.50 on other pickled fish, on other fish 50 cents per 100 lbs., and on other fish oils 20 per cent, ad. val.

Paper making is receiving substantial encouragement in Victoria, Australia. The Legislative Assembly of the colony recently voted a donation of \$7,500 to an importer of paper-mill machinery.
