THE NEXT MOVE.

The acceptance of the office of Judge of the County Court by the Hon. H. C. MacDonald, will, of course, vacate the seat for Be fast. It is possible, indeed it is probable, that the Government, struggling for its existence, will not at once proceed to fill the seat. Fort Augustus has been practically robbed of one of its representatives in the Legislative Assembly why not Belfast? We may be certain, at all events, that the Government will bring on the election when they imagine that they can make the greater number of votes out of the construction of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway. But we have also no doubt that the people of Belfast will try the Government upon its own merits and demerits and not upon those of the Federal Administration! Every tub should stand upon its own bottom, and so should every Government. Nor will the leading part played by the Conservatives in forcing the railway matter upon the attention of the Parliament and people of Canada, and in committing the Government of Canada to railway construction in this Province, be forgotten when the Liberals seek to make capital out of it.

Not the seat for Belfast only, but the office of Attorney General will be rendered vacant by the judicial appointment. This important office must necessarily be filled promptly. It has been whispered about town, lately, that the Attorney-General's office will be filled by the appointment of a gentleman who will not be called upon to hold a seat in the Legislature. This plan, if it could be carried out, would be such a frank confession of weakness, such a barefaced admission that the Government know that they have lost the confidence of the country, that we cannot believe that it will be entertained for a moment. It is, moreover, as everyone knows, contrary to the principles of responsible government, and contrary to the practice of all administrations since the beginning of the Confederation era. Bearing this fact in mind the following provisions of the Act 53 Vic., Cap. 4 seem, by implication, to be conclusive:—

40. (1) Except as hereinafter specially provided, no person who is a member of the Senate of the Dominion of Canada, or a member of the Dominion House of Commons, or who accepts or holds an office, commission or employment in the service of the Government of the Province of Prince Edward Island, at the nomination of the Crown, or by, from, through or under any department in the public service of the Dominion of Canada or the Province of Prince Edward Island, to which an annual salary is attached, shall be eligible as a member of the Legislative Council or House of Assembly, nor shall he sit or vote in the same, respectively, during the time he is a member of the said Senate, or a member of the said House of Commons, or during the time he holds such office, commission or employment.

(2.) Nothing in this section shall render ineligible, as aforesaid, any person holding any of the following offices, that is to say: Provincial Secretary-Treasurer and Commissioner of Public Lands, Attorney General, or Commissioner of Public Works, or shall disqualify him to sit or vote in the Legislative Council or House of Assembly: Provided he be elected while holding such office, and not otherwise disqualified, and be also at the same time a member of the Executive Council of this Province.

No, the Government will have to face the music in regard to the Attorney-Generalship, and that soon.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Judge McDonald received information of his appointment this forenoon. Of course THE EXAMINER'S advices were correct.

—The salaries which were "extravagant" for Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues in the ministry are not enough for Sir Wilfrid and his Liberal co-laborers.

—Mr. Preston, who operated the Liberal machine, remains in the pay of the Government of Canada, four thousand miles away. The government knows better than to dismiss him or bring him back to Canada.

—The parliamentary enquiry into the West Huron bye-election first indicated that there were ballots in the boxes that should not have been there; and it went to show that there were ballots out of the boxes that should have been in.

—The London Times thinks that Canada's case on the Alaskan boundary, according to the treaty of 1825, is very strong. Referring to the question of port privileges only in Canada, the Times adds "the case is eminently one for endeavoring by reasonable compromise to secure a solution giving both countries essential needs. There is no reason why two gates of entrance should not stand side by side."

—Hon. George Foster, who is leading the Opposition in the House of Commons in the absence of Sir Charles Tupper—made the following remarks upon the death of Sir James Edgar: "Death has come very suddenly; it has come to our side of the House as well. Colleagues of both sides have been stricken down very suddenly without a note of warning, and both sides have been afflicted. It only goes to show us that, as my right hon. friend has said, we are all living in the shadow of death, and it is a salutary lesson to us, in all our little differences, which are only little differences, we are members of one common family bound over a very short road for a land unknown. I think it ought to temper, as I have no doubt it does temper, the heat of party strife, and the impetuosity of party debate. At these times we—more than any other time—find that we are all men and brothers."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Halifax Herald: With the new batch of Railway subsidies, amounting to six and a half millions, the money voted this session will exceed \$60,000,000. Three years ago 40 millions was denounced as monstrous, and most unjustifiable. Now we have a "60 million session," and Sir Richard Cartwright is placid and happy.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that "The big six millions railway subsidies resolutions following the big fifty-one millions estimates, make it look as if a general election was in the wind. The hurrah of the expenditure of such sums might bring the spenders success. If they wait for the sober thought after the de-bauch their case is settled."

Montreal Gazette: A good deal of disappointment is being expressed because so little was accomplished at the Hague Peace Conference. There are others who think it well that so much was done. Time will probably justify the latter. Whatever provokes discussion on the merits of arbitration against war works for peace, and in many lands the Hague meeting has set the people thinking and out of people's thinking, grow great forces that affect great movements.

Montreal Star: The laboured effort of a section of the Liberal press to whip up some measure of excitement over the refusal of the Senate to permit the constituencies to be unconstitutionally meddled with in the interests of the party in power, while the public hardly feels the whipping as it stands gazing aghast at the tremendous expenditure of over sixty millions of dollars at a single session, is a spectacle at which even a taxpayer may take time to smile. What the public wants to hear is not abuse of the Senate for stalling by the constitution but a defence by the Ministers and their friends of this whole-souled raid on the Federal treasury. Yet the Liberal press continues to insist that the liberties of the people are being jeopardized by the autocratic action of the Senate, but cannot be induced to attempt to square a sixty million annual expenditure with the pre-election promises of the Liberal leaders.

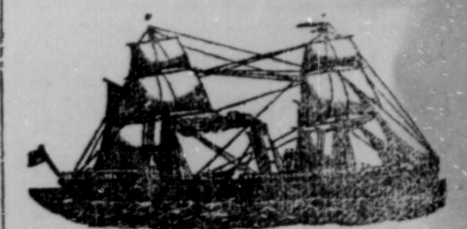
