Local and Other Items.

SYNAGOGUE SOLD.—The Jewish Synagogue in Halifax was a few days ago sold by the sheriff at the suit of the Free Baptist Conference who held a mortgage for \$1,350. The sum of \$1,700 was paid for the building, \$1,350 of which was left on mortgage. The synagogue was purchased by Abraham Michael, a prominent Hebrew citizen of Halifax.

YOUNG LIFE LOST.—A bad accident occurred near Orangeville, Ont., a few days ago. As the children were coming home from school in the afternoon some little girls caught onto a sleigh loaded with wood. Among the number was the 8-year-old daughter of John Davis. The load upset and tumbled over on the girl. She was not out as quickly as possible, but life was extinct.

THE TALBOT.—The Talbot, in which the body of Lord Herschell is going home to England, is one of the new second class cruisers of the Eclipse type. She is 5,600 tons displacement and has a speed of 20 knots. The Talbot, like all the vessels of her type, is armed with quick fire guns, five of 6 inch, six 4-7 inch, and several smaller guns. She is the largest vessel in the British North American squadron with the exception of the flagship Renown.

THEN AND NOW.—Less than three years ago Mr. J. Israel Tarte was declaring in the most solemn manner, as evidence of his political purity, that he was not worth twenty-five cents. Mr. Tarte is now a Minister, his son has blossomed out as the owners of a thirty thousand newspaper property and Mr. Tarte himself has just purchased a fifteen thousand dollar house on St. Louis Square, the swell French quarter in the city of Montreal.

BRITISH RAILROADS.—British railroads had a profitable business in 1898. The actual results of the eighteen British companies, whose figures are taken as representative of general railroad conditions throughout the mother country for the half year ending December 31, 1898, show gross earnings of over £49,000,000, an increase of £1,400,000, over the gross earnings of the corresponding half of 1897. The net revenues available for the payment of fixed charges and dividends amounted to slightly over £17,000,000, an increase of £124,000. Eight companies have been able to increase their dividends, six report an unchanged rate and in only four cases were slight increases in the distribution of profits to stockholders considered necessary.

Hazel Brook Notes.

A meeting of the shareholders was called on Thursday, March 9th, to take into consideration the fitting up of a cold storage room, and building of a house for the manager.

Hon. William Welsh took the floor, and in a forcible speech showed the advantages of cold storage. He said that steamers would call here every month. They would have cold storage and if we had the same, everything would be right. He expressed his satisfaction with the manner in which the business had been conducted, highly complimented the manager and directors on the flourishing condition of the factory, and hoped that they would keep up their reputation and build a suitable house for the manager.

Mr. R. Jenkins was opposed to cold storage. He said that we could ship our butter and cheese every month and did not need it. He spoke very highly of the manager (Mr. Burgess) and hoped he would stay with us, until he was too old to make butter and cheese.

The President, A. E. Dewar, said cold storage would cost something, but could we afford to do without it? He thought not. He said it was necessary to every well equipped factory. Mr. E. Wood, C. Myers, Robert Jenkins and others spoke in favor of cold storage. When it was moved by W. Welsh, Esq., seconded by A. McRae, Esq., that the company build a house, and put in cold storage. Carried unanimously.

A committee of three was appointed to procure a suitable site for a house.
