Dr. Koch's Lymph.

We learn from an authoritative source that Dr. Koch is greatly agitated because the wholesale manufacture of lymph has proved a failure. Originally this lymph was prepared in small phials, but Minister Gesler ordered the city manufacture of large quantities. Now that the time for the process has expired, Dr. Koch finds that the lymph is totally spoiled, and his own private preparations of lymph material destroyed.

The Society of Practical Medicine yesterday (says Router's Paris Agent) heard a communication from Dr. Beiss, who claims to have composed his synthesis, a fluid precisely similar to Dr. Koch's lymph. The doctor produced two phials one containing his own lymph and the other Dr. Koch's. The appearance of each was the same and Dr. Beiss declared that the reaction produced by his lymph in the laboratory corresponded exactly with those obtained with the German lymph, while the experiments made upon the tuberculous animals by means of this preparation, gave identical results. We are pleased to inform our readers that Dr. Geo. A. Baynes, of this city, has obtained a supply of the "Bacillie Virus," by last night's mail, and is prepared to treat patients suffering from tuberculous affections. Distress Among Employees.

GLASGOW, Jan. 7.—Much distress has been caused among the poor classes of this district on account of the railroad strike. The suffering increases daily. The stoppage of the many factories now idle through lack of fuel has thrown thousands of people out of employment who in no way are directly concerned in the struggle between the railroad companies and their employees.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, Jan. 7.—The West Riding Regiment is to be removed from Halifax to Barbados early in March. It is expected the 17th regiment will relieve them here.

Live Stock Committee Meeting.

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—The live stock investigation continued to-day and was perhaps the most interesting session of the series. Ex-Alderman Frankland and several Ontario gentlemen testified that on the whole Phansoll's theories were true on prices, in fact it has been abundantly proved that with permanent fixings cattle can be taken over both in winter and summer without any harm to the stock. It came out however that the attendants aboard ships are shamefully treated and that the food is poor and in some instances they had to eat meat from the buckets used for watering cattle.

McCarthy asked to Retire.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Advises received in this city from Boulogne state that O'Brien has been empowered to ask Justin McCarthy to retire from the chairmanship of the anti-Parrell section of the Irish party in favor of John Dwyer. M. P. or it is understood the Conference agreed if O'Brien preferred to do so that he (O'Brien) could serve as chairman according to the same advice. O'Brien and McCarthy are to have an interview at Boulogne to-morrow when a final settlement of the subject will be made. Gladstone, it is understood, has secretly approved of the plan decided upon. The Parrellites say he is pledged to abandon Parrell if he proves insincere in the pledges. Parrell and party have returned to England.
