Island Showing Reported Good In Heavy Competition

Reporting a good showing in very heavy competition, Major MacRae returned yesterday from the Royal Winter Fair where he helped his son Arthur show cattle entered under the long recognized name of A. MacRae and sons.
 The Central Royalty Ayrshire breeders showed the junior male champion in Woodland's Royal Burton 2nd. They sold the third highest priced cow at the sale of stars—Fairvue Kitty—and had a number of good placings in classes that numbered as many as 45 animals.
 Their junior yearling heifer, Fairvue Bluebell, placed third in her class and a senior yearling Leifer stood 10th in a class of 15. The MacRaes placed sixth in a class for cows 10 years and over with their veteran show cow, Fairvue Duchess.
 They were particularly happy about placing third with their junior herd. They were sixth in the progeny of dam class which had entries from 15 of the strongest Ayrshire herds in the country. Their junior champion bull also showed with a group that topped the class for junior get of sire.
 The young bull is a son of Pansy's Burton that this year won the senior and grand championship for the third time at the Royal.
 Their Fairvue Rosalie placed seventh in the class for five-year old cows in milk.
 Mr. MacRae said that Fairvue Duchess Jean, a heifer they sold at the sale of stars two years ago, stood second in her class of four year old cows in milk this year for her new owner.
 This year's sale of stars averaged \$600 and many of the animals sold were only two year olds. The top price was \$160.

City Students Crown King And Queen

Prince of Wales College students held the coronation of their king and queen in a ceremony during a dance at the college this evening.
 The occasion will be marked with a parade prior to the dance which will include cars carrying the royal couple and their prince and princesses followed by a large turnout of the student body.
 The parade through the city's streets will get underway about 8 p.m. from the Prince of Wales campus. The route will be Kent Street to Queen; Queen to Grafton; Grafton to Kent George; Kent George to Kent back to the college.

Freight Traffic Increases Over 1957 During October

An increase in carloads ferried from Cape Tormentine to Prince Edward Island and also from Borden to Cape Tormentine, is noted in the recent report issued by the Canadian National Railways, Island Division.
 An actual increase of 289 carloads were ferried from Cape Tormentine to Borden last month over October of last year, when the total was 1192. Similarly an increase of 66 carloads were transported from Borden to Tormentine over the 1249 of last October.
 The increase in imports is due to an increase in several items which combine to make the overall total greater. Some of these items are coal 227 (200); Fruits, 110 (106); fertilizer 104 (97); lime 56 (27); sandstone and gravel 315 (196); poles 12 (0); asphalt 85 (29); L.C.L. freight totalled 251 for the past month as compared with 240 this time last year.
 The importation of autos almost tripled over that of October 1957, since 28 carloads were ferried last month as compared with 11 a year ago.
 939 carloads of potatoes were exported from the Province in October, an increase of 107 over the same period last year. Live-stock also jumped from 131 carloads to 142 this year. 12 carloads of oysters and eight carloads of fishmeal were shipped during October, whereas none were shipped last year in the same month.
 It is also noted that in a few items there is a decline in the October shipping. Turnips dropped from 61 to 39; canned goods from 7 to 4; Irish Moss 8 to 4; pulpwood 14 to 11, and scrap iron from 10 to 4. L.C.L. freight declined to 59 cars as compared with 71 last year.

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Lions Told Blood Need Is Urgent

"The demand for blood from the reserve supply of the Red Cross Blood Bank in this Province is 10 per cent higher than it was last year, and at the present time this reserve is 400 pints behind its scheduled objective."
 These were some of the statistics quoted by Dr. I. Rachmel, in presenting a message of appeal from the Red Cross blood donors clinic, to the Charlottetown Lions Club at their regular dinner meeting held at the Queen Hotel last evening.
 The Red Cross is advising all service clubs and other community conscious organizations of the urgent need of increased blood donations to bolster their reserve supply to a point that will meet any emergency when they hold their next public donors clinic here early in December.
 Lion Rachmel's message was enthusiastically received by the meeting, which as a club, indicated its willingness to support this worthy cause wholeheartedly.
 The well attended meeting tabled and discussed a number of items on the club's business agenda, under the chairmanship of King Lion Lou Barnall.
 Sid Forbes of the Summerside Lions Club was visitor at the meeting.

New Steel Plant Opens In Ontario

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP)—An ultra-modern oxygen steel-making plant roared into production Tuesday as part of Algoma Steel Corporation's expansion program.
 The 63-ton heat of oxygen steel marked Algoma's entry into a select group of eight producers in the world who use the new method of making high-purity steel by directing high-purity oxygen on the face of molten iron.
 Dominion Foundries and Steel Limited, Hamilton, is the only Canadian producer of oxygen steel.
 A building 600 feet in length and 140 feet high—equivalent to a 10-storey building spread over a city block—houses the two oxygen steel furnaces now in operation at Algoma.

Charge TCA Inefficiency Costs 17 Million Yearly

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian Pacific Airlines maintained Wednesday that Trans-Canada Airlines' inefficiency costs \$17,000,000 a year.
 CPA suggested that rather than the government-run-line calculating a \$8,100,000 loss in facing projected trans-continental competition next year, TCA could make a net income of \$2,100,000.
 The arguments were made to the air transport board near the end of the long hearing on CPA's application to break TCA cross-country monopoly. It appeared that the last testimony might be finished today.
 He said TCA has a "poor operating result" with a ratio of 97 per cent in setting operating expenses against revenues.
 TCA counsel John Edison suggested that using figures advanced by Mr. Stenson, it would be possible to bring that operating ratio under 90 per cent "and there isn't an airline anywhere in the world that has operated at a ratio of 90 per cent lower in the last five years."
 Even if Mr. Stenson's figures had been halved, it was still "nonsense."
 Mr. Stenson said TCA had higher unit costs than U.S. carriers, lower employee productivity and was able to maintain full loads on its aircraft by being in a monopoly position rather than

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by accurate forecasting of flight demands.
 TCA labor expenses should be reduced by \$12,000,000 in two years, he said.

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
