Busy Season Planned At Charlottetown Golf Course

The first scheduled event for 1955 at the Charlottetown Golf Club will be held Saturday, May 21st. This event will be a two-ball men's foursome beginning at 2:00 p.m. Members are requested to phone or leave their name at the pro shop.

There will be a men's match against par on May 23rd, handicaps will apply with prizes for gross and net. The round may be played any time during the day.

The official club opening will be held May 28th. The event will be a two-ball mixed foursome at 2:00 p.m. The draw will be announced. Following the match there will be a bean supper and golf movies. That evening the entertainment committee will hold the opening dance.

National Golf Day is June 4th. On that date "Life" Magazine sponsor a match in which men play Ed Furgol, U. S. Open Champion and the women "Babe" Zaharias, U. S. Women's Open Champion. It is permissible to play this match earlier in the week. Full details will be published later. The gross proceeds are divided equally between the Canadian Red Cross and the development of Junior Golf in Canada.

HALIFAX—The Charlottetown Bowling team at the Nova Scotia-Prince Edward Island tournament here slipped Thursday from second place to a tie for third with Dartmouth Beazleys. The standings were up to the end of the 14th round. The 15th was still being played early this morning.

In the 13th round Thursday Charlottetown lost to Halifax Independents with a pinfall of 1435 to 1430. Three points went to the winners and one to Charlottetown.

In the 14th round Charlottetown lost again to Dartmouth Local 13, with a 1495-1467 pinfall, with another three for the winners, one for Charlottetown division of points.

The outstanding event of the day perhaps was the 22 point split by Halifax Conn Martell, the leaders of the tournament with the Halifax Kaplans, the defending champions in the 14th round. Kaplans were making a better showing during the day.

Giants Climb Back Into Second Place In National League With Win Over Braves

MILWAUKEE, (AP)—New York Giants climbed back into second place in the National League Thursday by nosing out Milwaukee Braves 3-2 on the batting of Willie Mays and Don Mueller.

Mays drove in the first run with a single and the winning marker with a long fly. Mueller, who collected three hits, doubled home the other run.

Big Jim Hearn went the route, giving up 10 hits for his sixth victory against two defeats. The game was the only one played in the majors.

One of the hits off Hearn was Hank Aaron's eighth homer of the season in the second which gave the Braves a 1-0 lead.

New York caught up with fourth Ernie Johnson in the fifth Davy when singles by Mueller, Hank Thomson and Mays gave the Giants their first run.

Singles by Joe Adcock and Danny O'Connell and Del Crandall's sacrifice fly put the Braves ahead 2-1 in the bottom of the fourth.

The Giants got the full range on Johnson in the fifth Davy Williams and Al Dark singled and Mueller rapped a double to score the run.

Marciano Denies He Plans To Retire In Sept.

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Rocky Marciano has denied a report that he might consider retiring after a September fight.

The rugged Rocky, who retained his world heavyweight title Monday night by walloping England's Don Cockell in San Francisco, was asked about the report here Wednesday after arriving from the north.

"There's nothing to it," he told a Los Angeles Times reporter. "I've never felt better than I did training for the Cockell fight. As long as I feel good and feel like fighting I intend to fight."

Wednesday, following a San Francisco interview, Lester Bromberg, New York World-Telegram and Sun boxing writer, quoted Marciano as saying: "I know I haven't been going forward since the first fight with Ezzard Charles. If I don't look the way I feel I should in the fall fight, I'll think about stepping out as a fighter."

Hero's Welcome For Cockell

LONDON, (CP)—Don Cockell will get a hero's reception in his native London borough of Battersea upon his return from the United States, it was announced Thursday.

Borough Mayor S. F. C. Spore said Cockell agreed by transatlantic telephone to attend the civic reception.

Although Cockell failed to wrest the heavyweight crown from Rocky Marciano in San Francisco Monday, British sports writers have hailed him as the "real hero" of the contest. One sports writer suggested after the ninth round technical knockout that Britons should "light the beacons" on the hillsides for a valiant warrior's home-coming.

Million-Dollar Damage Suit In U. S. Basketball

NEW YORK (AP)—A Washington, D.C., group filed a \$1,000,000 damage suit in federal court Thursday against the National Basketball Association and its president, Maurice Podoloff, charging violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The suit was filed by the Washington, D.C., Professional Basketball Club, Inc., which charges the NBA has refused to approve transfer of Baltimore Bullets' franchise to Washington and "has refused to tell the reasons why."

Orders Probe Of Soccer Riot

TORONTO (CP)—Mayor Nathan Phillips Thursday called for a complete police report on a riot among fans attending a city soccer game Wednesday night which halted play and made police protection necessary for the referee.

The disturbance ended a match between Hungary and Olympic teams of the National Soccer League.

The fans stormed across the field and chased referee A. Davies until he was rescued by police officers and escorted home.

The riot was one of a series of disturbances at soccer games in city parks this season.

Moore Pronounced Fit

NEW YORK (AP)—Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore has been examined by New York state athletic commission physicians and pronounced fit to fight, Dr. Marvin A. Stevens, chairman of the commission's medical advisory board, said Thursday.

The examination paved the way for Moore's title defence against middleweight champion Bobo Olson here June 22. The contracts have not yet been filed, but presumably they will be approved.

Stevens said that he, Dr. Vincent Nardiello and Dr. Iran McCown had examined Moore and "found no pathology." In addition, Dr. Lloyd Barnes took an electrocardiogram of Moore's heart and found it normal.
