



### NEW MACHINE FOR S'SIDE DAIRY

A new milk bottle washing machine is seen en route to the Ideal Dairy in Summerside where it was installed Wednesday night and placed in operation yesterday morning. Weighing 8700 pounds, the machine has a capacity of 24 to 26 bottles per minute in sizes from 7 ounces to 2 quarts. The

bottles are laid on a tray in front of the machine and automatically fed into it, carried around, soaked in an alkali tank, and pressure washed by spray jets from two pumps. The bottles continue through chlorine rinse and are discharged from the machine and automatically, filled with milk,

so that bottles are not touched by hands from the time they are put into the machine until and ready for delivery. This machine, which is the only one of its particular make in P.E.I., has been purchased by Elmer Offer, owner of Ideal Dairy, and has been installed by N. Harris of Moncton.

### \$1,095 Is Awarded Estate In S'side Damages Action

Damages of \$1,095, plus \$75 costs were awarded the plaintiff, Mrs. Georgie Quigley, Mt. Tryon, executrix of the estate of the late Harry Quigley in an action for damages in the amount of \$4,385, which concluded yesterday afternoon in Supreme Court summons before Mr. Justice

G.J. Tweedy. The defendant was Reginald Francis Noonan, Albany, who was found sixty-five per cent negligent in the accident and the plaintiff thirty-five per cent.

The action resulted from a fatal collision at North Tryon on the night of September 25, 1957, when a car driven by the defendant collided with a tractor driven by the late Mr. Quigley who died as a result of injuries received.

Evidence revealed that at the time of the accident Quigley was operating a tractor on the highway with a white light at the rear, which the defendant claimed he mistook for a vehicle with one light coming toward him.

The defendant was found to be sixty-five per cent negligent in that he failed to reduce his speed and the plaintiff thirty-five per cent for not having the tractor equipped with a red light at the rear as required by the Highway Traffic Act.

Disbursements were levied at funeral expenses \$300, tractor \$600, suffered by estate as result of Harry Quigley's death \$1,900, a total of \$1,900. Sixty-five per cent of this total is \$1,235. However Noonan's car was valued at \$400 and thirty-five per cent of this is \$140. The difference between the two amounts totalling \$1,095, was the amount awarded the plaintiff.

J. Watson MacNaught Q.C. was counsel for the defendant and R.S. Hinton, Q.C. for the plaintiff.
