SUMMERSIDE — Summerside's town council was brought to a standstill yesterday when the councillors voted to acclaim the retiring Mayor J. Ernest Morrison by acclamation. The motion was passed at nomination deadline 4:00 p.m.

The bye-election, which was called to fill the vacancy created by Morrison's resignation, was held on Monday night. Morrison was re-elected by acclamation a year ago as councillor in the Centre ward.

Newfoundland Mink Ranching Provides Jobs

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Seven contractors in Newfoundland will have paid nearly \$4,500,000 in wages to Newfoundlanders in the past year, it was established today.

NEED MORE PENALTIES

Money from each country that goes toward the regular budget is based on the gross national product of each member country. The regular budget is paid for by a country's contribution to a two-year period. It does its right to vote in the General Assembly.

However, no such penalty is levied on the extraordinary budget which pays for such items as the United Nations Emergency Force. It was revealed today 14 countries contributed toward the cost of maintaining the United Nations Truce Supervision Force.
