A Cure for Cholera.—There is not now, and we hope there never will be, any reason to fear an invasion of this community by cholera. We have had cholera here, however, and in the hope of preventing its return, therefore, which was addressed by a military gentleman to an old country newspaper many years ago, may be well worth preserving for reference on the approach of summer.

Sir.—As so much fear seems to exist upon the probable approach of cholera to the country, I think it my duty to lay the following facts before the public, and to refer it to your discretion to publish them or not.

1st Instance.—A planter with a number of coolies on his estate, had 200 cases of severe Asiatic cholera—no deaths.

2d Instance.—100 troops in an isolated position, and no medical aid, had 12 cases—no deaths.

Treatment in all cases.

1st. Put the patient to bed in a room, with plenty of air and light (and the light); do not induce sleep.

2d. Talk to the patient till he recovers.

3d. Place a greenish tin (filled with water) across the stomach, so as to completely cover the region of the liver and reach fully to the other side; sprinkle the plaster with a little turpentine, and change it every 4 or 5 hours.

4th. Place the feet in hot water and mustard for ten minutes.

5th. Immediately upon the complaint of sickness having been made administer an emetic of

3 grains Tartar Emetic,

and lukewarm water ad lib, until the patient has vomited a greenish mass of bile, and is able. If necessary repeat the dose in half an hour. Ten minutes after the vomiting give a glass of hot brandy in hot water (but not in the case of cholera) if the amount vomited is small.

6th. Let the patient get up as soon as he feels lively enough to do so, but above all things remember that it is a great error to try and induce the patient to sleep or fall pain by stimulants, or otherwise, until the poison, "which I have seen in 211 cases," has been rid of.

I enclose my name, and if any medical officer in Liverpool will call upon me at my address, I will be happy to explain to him the rationale of the treatment I have thus described, as having been communicated to me by an old planter in Mauritius, and seen by myself in 211 cases.
