... (Special) — Two harbor improvement projects in Prince Edward Island are scheduled to start this summer. The projects are for the harbor at St. John's and the harbor at Charlottetown. The estimated cost of the projects is \$45,000. The work will be done by the Public Works Department. The projects will improve the harbors and make them safer for fishing boats. The work will start in July and will be completed by September.

—The Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, Hon. T. William L. Frowe, together with the Premier of the Province, Hon. Alex W. Matheson, Q.C., were present at the Kinsmen dinner last evening and extended the official welcome of the Province and government to the delegates from the three other Provinces. The meeting was presided over by J. Elmer Murphy, past president of the Summerside Club, who also introduced Mr. Walthen Gaudet, manager of the Charlottetown centennial committee, who spoke briefly on the program that will continue throughout the summer at Charlottetown in connection with the city's centennial observance. The after-dinner entertainment in the form of song and dialogue was provided by Kinsmen from Newfoundland, Cape Breton, and Summerside clubs, and the evening program concluded with the governor's ball. At the business session yesterday reports were given both by district officers, and by the president of each club. Today's business program will include the election of district officers, and the presentation of district trophies. An interesting highlight of Friday night's program was the presentation of a gong and gavel to the district organization from the Glace Bay club by their president, Ron MacDonald. This gong and gavel was presented in memory of the late Hughie MacCuisic, past district governor, who met an untimely death in a hunting accident a few years ago. She then introduced Mr. Gordon MacDonald, chairman of Red Cross Disaster Services for the Province, who congratulated the class and spoke of the need for people trained in first aid to assist in the Disaster Services. The Liberals seem to have learned the trick of holding on to power and are mighty hard to dislodge. A few words of welcome to our local Kinsmen for completing ten years of exceptional meritorious service to the youth of Summerside. All our service clubs have been doing yeoman service, but the Kinsmen have been active in the youth field particularly, and no one can ever measure the results of their labors in healthful activity and the happiness which always goes with it among the youth of our town. Without this club's activities, the youth picture would have been vastly different, and parents can indeed be grateful to this energetic group of Summerside men.
