A WARNING.—Last fall a parcel of new \$10 notes was stolen from the "Consolidated Bank of Canada." They were perfect notes—without the counter signature. The Rt. Rev. Dr. McIntyre, Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown, and several priests from P. E. Island, have been here on an official visit for the past four weeks; during which time His Lordship has consecrated two new Roman Catholic churches and established a Convent of the Sisters of the congregation of Notre Dame of Montreal at House Harbor, and administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to a large number of persons. He will return home by steamer to-day.

The weather for the past fortnight has been very stormy, causing much damage to the hay and grain crops.

The boat, cod and mackerel fisheries have been good on the inshore grounds about twenty sail of American mackerel men have been in Pleasant Bay and report inshore fisheries good.

WAR DISPATCHES.

Another Turkish Success

(Special to the Daily Examiner.)

LONDON, Aug. 22.

The Turks assaulted and carried the works of the enemy at Shiptka, aking possession of the village and pursuing the Russians out of the pass. Tirnova is now considered untenable. The Porte has contributed 50,000 militia at Adrianople. Sofia and other places were the scene of operations.

As President McMahon was leaving Cherboung on Sunday a Republican demonstration occurred.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 21.

Yesterday was very hot. To-day was boisterous and unsettled. In Scotland, during the week, ceaseless heavy rains are doing much harm to standing and root crops. They are said to have been the heaviest summer rains in many years.

The iron-clad Agincourt, on sailing for Besika Bay, took 400 sets of entrenching tools.

Frederick Cavill started at 3.40 yesterday afternoon from Cape Grinez to swim across the English Channel, and arrived within fifty yards of the English coast near Dover at 3.45 this morning. He was then taken into a boat, the sea being rough and the breakers high. It was considered unsafe for him to land.

Outlook in India is now desperate; in Goojerat and Katewar, and seriously threatening in Central India, Rajhootana, Punjab and Burmah, the latter in consequence of heavy exports of grain. The Council of

LONDON, Aug. 21.

It is stated that Kossuth addressed a proclamation to Hungarians, urging Austro-Hungary to come to an understanding with the Porte, which can be made without compromising the integrity of the Turkish empire. On the basis of this arrangement an alliance with the Porte ought to be concluded and Russia should then be called upon to terminate the war.

Bombay has determined to construct or extend several railways as relief works.

A Vienna despatch to the Times says a telegram from Constantinople yesterday states that for five days there has been no news from Osman Pasha. This has caused uneasiness, and it is feared his communications with Sofia are interrupted by Russians.

The Porte, however, denies that Osman Pasha is hemmed in. Reuter's telegram company has advices from Osman Pasha's army dated August 19th.

The Times Theropin despatch says British military attache with Turkish forces telegraphs from Eskidjuna that 15,000 refugee Mussulmans are there.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.

The agreement between the Western Union and Atlantic Pacific Companies provides that the Companies retain distinctive organization, but the receipts are to be pooled at 87 1/2 per cent. to the former and the balance to the latter. No rivalry between the companies, and where there are two offices in one place, one is to be abolished. The tariff will probably be changed in some cases necessary advances, and in others possible reductions will be made.
