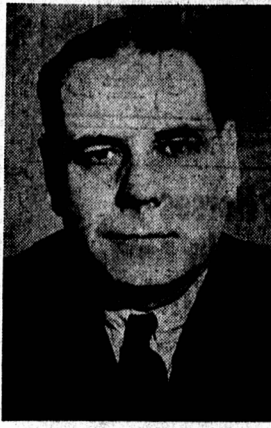
P. E. I. Drama Festival Playoffs Get Underway

D. P.'s Arrive For Queen's Co. Farms

Through arrangements by the National Employment Office nine D.P.'s have arrived in Charlottetown to work on Queen's County farms. All of the new Canadians are of Polish nationality, and none of the group appeared to be more than thirty-five years of age. One man, a university graduate, was accompanied by his wife, who worked for the American Army of occupation as a stenographer for some time. Both speak excellent English. Of the remaining eight, several are married but were not accompanied by their wives at this time. The newcomers went to the National Employment Office direct from the railroad station where they were met by the farmers with whom they will work. Before leaving for their new homes they were briefed on Island conditions by a Polish interpreter who has been resident in the province more than four years.

The farmers with whom the new Canadians will work are John Angus MacLean, Belfast; A. A. McBeath, Marshfield; Millar Orr, New Glasgow; Louis Pineau, Rusticville; Arthur Hughes, Bedford; Knudson Jorgensen, Fredericton; W. R. Jenkins, Frenchfort; Lincoln Dewar, New Perth; Ivan MacDonald, York.

About fifty men who were interviewed, medically examined and accepted for work in Labrador are still waiting in Charlottetown for further instructions. It became known today that the hold-up is due to lack of accommodations at the scene of the work. Large army barracks with a capacity of 2000 men are available near the job but the negotiations to loan or lease them to the company have not yet been concluded. The barracks belong to the American Government. If the barracks are secured all the men standing by in Charlottetown and many other towns in the Maritimes will be sent to Labrador as quickly as they can be flown there. If not there will be delay until housing accommodation is built. A decision is expected in the next few days. This information was received from the head office of the contractors of the new air-base to their headquarters in Moncton today. Only 180 men have been moved to Labrador to date.

Leaving Shortly On Trip To Old Country Display Features P.E.I. Oyster Industry

Drama Festival In Full Swing

By KAY REX (Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Ont., May 15 — (CP) — Les Compagnons de Notre-Dame de Three Rivers, Que., have made their bid for Dominion Drama Festival honors with "Ma Petite Ville," a French version of Thornton Wilder's full-length play "Our Town".

It was the first of two French-language entries in the six-day competition which opened Monday night with Vancouver Repertory Players production of Thomas Job's "Therese". The second French-language presentation will come from Les Compagnons de Saint Laurent, nationally-known Montreal company which Thursday night will produce "Les Gueux au Paradis" (The Beggars at the Gates of Paradise) by Marlene and Obay. This is the first time the Three Rivers players have taken part in the country-wide contest. Some 40 of them arrived via chartered bus, all sporting natty navy blue blazers with the red, blue and gold crest of their troupe. Approximately 20 have parts in the play. The others have come
