

# Yankees Hold Lead In American League Race

New York Yankees remained at the head of the American League race Sunday but Chicago White Sox replaced Cleveland as the runner-up as the Indians' pennant hopes a severe blow.

The Yankees and White Sox split the doubleheader to remain a half-game apart as New York won the opener 6-1 and Chicago the second 3-2 before 50,990, the largest crowd of the season at Comiskey Park.

But the Indians, who went into the day tied for first with the Yankees, were the victims of a Washington uprising, 8-2 and 13-4, and dropped a full game off the pace.

**SOX CLOUT ATHLETICS**  
Meanwhile, Boston Red Sox picked up a half-game by clouting Kansas City Athletics 14-2. The victory coupled with the Yankees' split moved them within 3/4 games of the top Baltimore and the Tigers were rained out at Detroit and the game was scheduled as part of a doubleheader today.

Home runs played a big role in both of the Yankee-White Sox games. In the first Mickey Mantle hit a three-run homer in the third inning to give Whitey Ford a comfortable margin. Yogi Berra also homered with one on in the fifth. It was Mickey's 34th and Berra's 32nd. Ford racked up his 15th victory of the season.

Bob Kennedy accounted for all of the Sox runs in the nightcap. With two mates aboard he homered in the first inning off Bob Turley, and Dixie Howell protected the margin with sharp relief pitching after Billy Pierce left in the seventh.

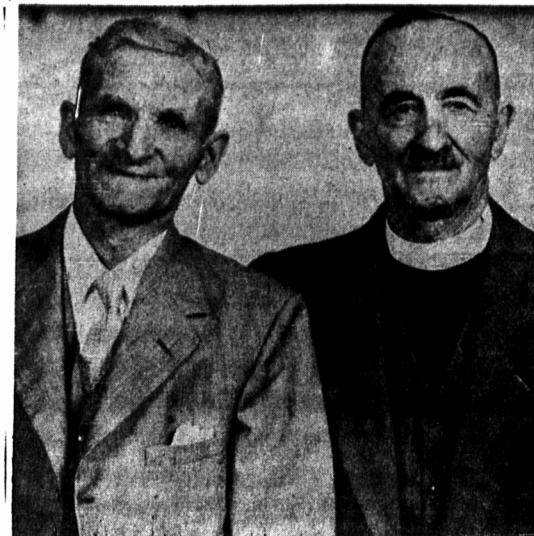

The Rev. Ernest S. Weeks and Albert J. Weeks of Bedouque, P. E. I. will celebrate their 80th birthday on Tuesday, August 30th, 1955. They are sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Weeks, and were born at Fredericton, P. E. I.

After attending P. W. C. Charlottetown, Ernest taught school for four years at Hazel Grove. In 1901 he entered Mount Allison University and graduated B.A. in 1904. The next two years were spent on a Methodist Church charge in Northern New Brunswick, he having been accepted as a candidate for the ministry. He returned to Mt. Allison in 1906 for his course in theology and graduated B.D. in 1907 and in 1921 received an M.A. He was ordained in 1907.

After serving charges for 14 years on P. E. I., he went to N. B. where he had pastorates for 19 years, and in 1949 he retired from the active ministry and took up residence in Sackville where he remained for five years, then moved to Bedouque where he and his twin brother erected the residence where he now lives.

In 1907 Albert settled on a farm at Carleton Place for over 40 years he successfully carried on mixed farming. He retired in 1943 and moved to Bedouque. # Leaves Talk At Alberton On World Tour

Many citizens of Alberton and surrounding districts enjoyed a rare treat Friday evening when Miss Helen Kerr gave an illustrated lecture on her recent world tour. The lecture, which gave evidence of much thoughtful preparation, was delivered in a charmingly informal manner which delighted the audience and gave to them vivid word pictures of many places of interest as well as some entertaining sidelights.

Miss Kerr described life aboard ship, as she sailed the Pacific toward Australia, with stops at Honolulu and the Fiji Islands. After disembarking at Sydney she was soon assigned a school where she taught for some months. The holiday time she visited much of the surrounding country.

She described the development of Australia as somewhat similar to that of Canada. Of the appearance of that country, she says its beauty is less obvious than that of North America. Due to lack of rain the predominating color is brown. As one becomes accustomed to the country one is able to discern its subtle type of beauty. She described the Great Barrier Reef, (largest coral reef in the world), with its plant and animal life. The people of Australia are carefree, happy and fond of sports. Leaving Australia aboard a Italian immigrant ship she sailed toward Ceylon, an extremely beautiful country, then on to India.

Miss Kerr feels that no Westerner could describe India but one would have to visit there to understand it. Having travelled some five thousand miles in India, she saw a good deal of the existing conditions. Extremes of poverty and wealth are to be found. She experienced extreme heat during her time there, temperatures of 116 to 118, and heard the rejoicing of the people when the monsoon came for without the monsoon there would be famine. She described the bazaars with their beautiful handicraft, throngs of religious pilgrims at Benares, the sacred city of the Hindus, and many other aspects of life in India.

Her next stop of any length was at Durban where she again taught school. She told of the strict racial segregation being enforced in South Africa. She visited Capetown and travelled up through the heart of Africa to Cairo, then on to Syria, Turkey, Yugoslavia and Italy. With companions she hitch hiked through many European countries, sleeping in youth hostels, visiting museums and art galleries, attending operas and hearing orchestras, and attending a bull fight in Spain.

At the conclusion of Miss Kerr's lecture, Mr. Herbert Leavitt showed and described a number of very interesting pictures taken while he and Mrs. Leavitt were on a year trip which took them up the St. Lawrence, the Saguenay and the Richelieu Rivers, through the inland waterway to the Hudson River and up the coast to Boston. This part of the evening's entertainment was also thoroughly enjoyed.
