

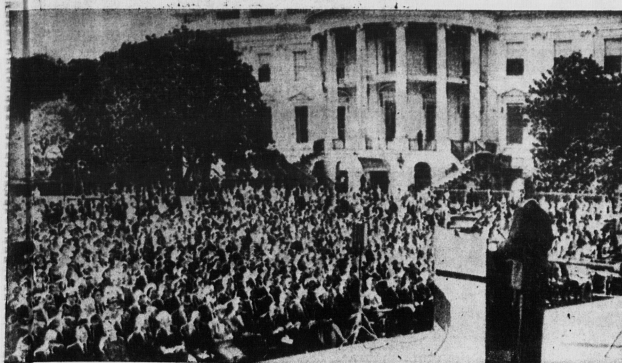

PLANS VISIT TO CANADA
OTTAWA (CP)—The Duke of Devonshire, British minister of state for Commonwealth relations, will visit Canada May 8-10. He will address the annual banquet of the Royal Commonwealth Society in Montreal May 8, then travel to Ottawa where he will be the guest of Governor General Vanier at Government House. The duke will visit Victoria May 12 and officially open the British Columbia International Trade Fair in Vancouver May 13.

MONTREAL (CP)—N. R. Crump, chairman and president of Canadian Pacific Railway Company, said Wednesday the economic climate both in Canada and in the rest of the world is stable and forecast a favorable environment for CPR's operations during most of this year. Citing good outlooks in such economic sectors as resources, exports, public investment, employment and consumer liquidity, Mr. Crump said at the CPR annual meeting: "These factors suggest that consumer expenditure will remain buoyant throughout 1964 and that the business environment should remain favorable for your company's activities throughout most of the year."

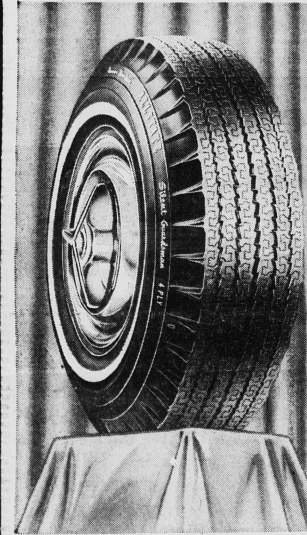
Air Marshal Slemon To Retire This Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian governments changed, the cold war thawed or became more frigid, new weapons systems came and went, but RCAF Air Marshal Roy Slemon seemed to go on forever. The 60-year-old Winnipeg native became the first deputy commander of North American Air Defence Command (NORAD) when the 20,000-man Canada-US force was established in the late summer of 1957. He has occupied this position ever since through seven nerve-racking years. Defence Minister Hellyer announced Wednesday that Air Marshal Slemon, who joined the RCAF in 1924 when it was formed, will retire from the air force this summer.

Mr. Hellyer said in a statement: "In his responsible position of deputy commander-in-chief of NORAD, Air Marshal Slemon has shown leadership, judgment and ability of the highest order and his dedication to service and country is an example for all Canadian service personnel."

Slemon said his job required him to be a slave to the telephone. He has a phone in each room of his house, one in his car, another in any aircraft he travels in. In seven years, he has hardly ever been out of touch with his office. He formed the RCAF's No. 4 bomber group in 1942 in Britain and was deputy commander of the RCAF's Central Bomber Command for several months of the Second World War. He served as chief of air staff from 1963 to 1957.
