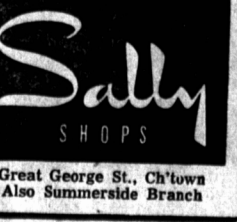

URGE SUEZ BOYCOTT

"In view of the situation between Israel and Egypt, merchant shipping is advised, for the present and until further notice, to keep clear of the Suez Canal and of Egyptian and Israeli waters," an admiralty statement said.
