In 1815 the royal mews at Charing
Cross were standing on the actual
site now occupied by Nelson's column a
long wooden shed was placed, and in it
was the skeleton of a whale of great
dimensions. Through it the writer
walked from end to end.

Opposite stood, as now they stand,
spring gardens, where in old times the
beaus and belles of the court of Charles
II disported themselves. There in a
house was located "the learned pig."

Bystanders desirous of seeing its per-
formance stood in a circle, and within
a smaller one playing cards were ap-
parently indiscriminately thrown down.
Onlookers, possibly confederates, named
a particular card, and the pig trotted
round and placed his snout on the nam-
ed card without an error.

From that exhibition, the writer, in
the same house (he thinks), was taken
and introduced to "the Hottentot Ven-
us," an ebony damsel clad in gauzy
garments of the most flimsy kind, who
displayed her figure by proudly travers-
ing and circling round the room in
which she gave her receptions.

to the horse guards parade to see the
cannon used by the French as a mortar
during the siege of Cadiz, 1812. It was
on a carriage in a horizontal position,
