

# Kensington High School Opening Ceremonies Held

After the corner stone was laid yesterday afternoon by the Minister of Education, Hon. Keir Clark, the ribbon cutting ceremony was performed by Miss Olive Thompson, a teacher at Kensington for the past 30 years, and the new High School at Kensington was officially opened.

Some 300-400 persons were present for the occasion assembled in the auditorium where a number of his speeches were heard from members of the Dominion, Provincial, and Municipal Governments, the Department of Education, the clergy, the architect, and contractors.

Mr. Ron Kennedy, chairman of the Board of Trustees, who presided during the program, announced that Mount Allison University had made an annual scholarship, of a minimum of \$150.00, available to the student with the highest standing in grade XII in the Kensington High School, who will be attending Mount Allison University.

Guest speaker, Mr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education, said he was greatly honored at having a part in the official opening ceremonies and stated that this was the 121st school opened on P. E. I. in the past seven years. Mr. Shaw said that the new High School is one of the finest in the Province and that the trustees, architect, builders and ratepayers are to be congratulated. He stressed to the ratepayers that the school should not be regarded as an expenditure so much as an investment, stating that the greatest resource in any community, province, or nation is the human resource and that the money used to construct the building is an investment in the development of this resource.

Mr. Shaw said that conditions of the world today demand a far greater amount of education and a different type of education than they did a few years ago, to keep in line with the requirements of the present day.

"You have here," he said, "the best type of education possible. You can't keep children in a building such as this with the very best equipment, well lighted and heated, and in a cheery atmosphere, without them gaining something from such an environment. This environment, he said, will give the students a brighter, better, more cheerful outlook on life. To the teachers, Mr. Shaw said, "You have conditions here of which you will be able to give your best service."

To the pupils the guest speaker said there is a challenge — while making use of the school and equipment do not abuse it. Keep the school an honored place in the community, he said. Mr. Shaw concluded by saying he hoped everyone present felt they shared a part in this great project — that of the development of young people — which is the greatest asset any community can have.

Other dignitaries present, all of whom addressed the large assembly were, Rev. E. E. Bean; Mr. Keith Pickard, architect; Mr. Charles Linkletter of the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd.; Hon. C. C. Baker; Rev. L. F. Callaghan; Mayor W. H. Darrach; J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries; and Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, director of education.

During the ceremonies the Kensington School Girls Chorus rendered two appropriate selections, under the direction of Principal Thomas Hall. Mr. Elmer Power was accompanist.

At the invitation of Mr. Kennedy, the guests inspected the various classrooms in the building, and enjoyed a snack served by the ladies of the Kensington Community Club at the conclusion of the program.
