First Aid Workers Urged To Help Avoid Accidents

Ten Red Cross workers have received re-qualification seals for their First Aid Instructors Certificates. These men and women attended a refresher course at Red Cross Headquarters during the last week in December. Dr. Ross Stewart gave four separate lectures on the physiological aspects of the conditions resulting from accidents. Sister St. Mary Irene of the Charlottetown Hospital presented case histories of accident victims and Mrs. Harry Gudmore discussed the recommended First Aid treatments. Dr. Burton Howatt, Health Officer and Miss Alice Trainor, Public Health Nurse were on the programme during the final session. Their topic was "The Importance of Accident Prevention." Dr. Howatt stated "Accidents are a greater child-killer than the top ten infectious diseases. However, of perhaps equal, or more importance is the fact that for every fatal accident there are from 100 to 150 non-fatal accidents which may lead to prolonged suffering, long hospitalization and even life-long disability." Dr. Howatt went on to say: "Continuous education appears to be the main weapon available to reduce the accident rate." Miss Trainor gave some very practical suggestions on the control of accidents in the homes. Mrs. Gudmore in outlining the Red Cross accident prevention programme, said that one hospital in the province had treated approximately 900 accident victims during 1955. The Red Cross through its First Aid classes is teaching accident prevention in all parts of the province. More instructors, however, are necessary to carry on this important educational programme.
