

Maritime Welter Crown At Stake Here Tonight

The answer to a big question that local boxing fans have been asking one another during the past few weeks — "Can Harry Poulton regain his Maritime welterweight crown from Tommy 'Gun' Spencer?" — will be decided at the Forum tonight when the champion and challenger meet there in a 10-round title go.

The opening bout is scheduled for 8:30. Battling to a draw decision after ten rounds of torrid action here on July 31st that saw Spencer retain his Maritime crown, the two boys will meet here again tonight in the second title match in less than a month.

Their last meeting was a highlight in the recent annals of boxing history in this quarter and the advance predictions foretell an even bigger and better contest tonight when the local, smooth punching challenger steps into the ring in a do or die effort to regain his crown.

It will be a tough proposition however for the local boxer. He hit the canvas twice during their last meeting from devastating left hooks from the New Waterford champion, and Poulton will have to bring into play every ounce of his fighting ability tonight if he hopes to be the final victor. Ciever boxing was Poulton's big asset in their last meeting and since that time he has been concentrating on sharpening up his hitting power to match that of his opponent, and if he proves to have done that, then watch out, because it will be the type of match that will be a hair-raiser from start to finish.

Special Bout Cancelled

A special six-round supporting bout between George "Big Boy" Peterson, former Island heavyweight title holder, and Austin Squarebriggs, both of this City,

was cancelled last night by promoter Bill Brown when the two fighters failed to come to an agreement with him over the weight of gloves to be used. Promoter Brown maintained last night that in view of the fact that Peterson was some fifty or sixty pounds heavier than his opponent, he wanted them to use eight ounce gloves instead of six to prevent any chance of serious injury. "They disagreed," quoted Bill, "so I cancelled the bout."

Continuing, promoter Brown stated: "After all, I am responsible for those boys when I ask them to get into the ring and fight, and I don't want to see any of them injured through neglect on my part whether they are willing to take the chance themselves or not. I think the general sporting public will agree with me in taking such a stand in the matter."

Although it was too late to do anything about replacing the bout with another, Bill still has three good supporting bouts for the main event, designed to give attending fans a wide variety of boxing action.

In the semi-final, Island lightweight champion Bud Lund will tangle with Jackie Hayden of Westville, N.S., in a six round contest, while in a four-round "winner take all affair" Lloyd Carr, City, will swap punches with Bud Ramsay of Summerside. The curtain raiser will bring together Ralph Fitzsimmons of Long River and Bobby Gailant of Charlottetown.

A third man, Austin Squarebriggs, who was also scheduled to appear in tonight's card went through a brisk workout, but in view of an announcement made by promoter Bill Brown later last night, it was a waste of time and effort for the local scrapper. Scheduled to meet former Island heavyweight champion George "Big Boy" Peterson in a special six-round feature, the bout was called off last night by promoter Brown when the two contestants failed to come to an agreement as to the weight of the gloves to be used.

Confirm Crater Made By Meteor

TORONTO, Aug. 24 — (CP)— Dr. V. Ben Meen said tonight that a six-man expedition to the Chubb Crater in Northern Quebec has corroborated his theory that the big hole was made by a meteor.

Dr. Meen, 40-year-old director of the Royal Ontario Museum of Geology and Mineralogy, returned today from his second trip to the Ungava crater he helped to discover last year.

The group spent four weeks exploring the teacup-shaped crater, which is 2 1/2 miles in diameter and holds an 850-foot-deep lake. Dr. Meen said the party found no meteorite fragments but, exactly where several authorities had said a meteorite body should lie beneath the rock on the east side of the crater, a magnetometer indicated a substantial quantity of magnetic deposit.

The expedition was a joint one by the National Geographic Society of the United States and the Royal Ontario Museum. Its members flew to the barren crater site between Hudson Bay and Ungava Bay.

Dr. Meen believes the Chubb Crater was made by a plunging meteorite which exploded when it struck the earth between 3,000 and 15,000 years ago.

The Reds broke off the stalled talks Aug. 23, alleging an Allied plane tried to "murder" the Communist negotiators.

There was no immediate response from Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, U. N. commander to whom the Red message was directed.

He already had rejected their charges as lies.

The statement by North Korean Premier Kim Il Sung and Chinese Red Gen. Peng Teh-Huai was broadcast early today by the Peiping radio.

The Red conditions were so harsh that it appeared the future of the truce talks remained critically imperilled but that the Communists were not yet ready to take responsibility for cancelling them.

One officer at Ridgway's headquarters said "I feel sure now that the Reds began this armistice talks business for the sole purpose of building up their army for a big attack. They were buying time, I think, and by now they have just about all they need."

McCormick, never in the Canadian amateur before or any other major tournament, lasted out a grim struggle to win one up.

Weslock, one of Canada's top-notch golfers, threatened to overhaul the Humber Valley player with a great last-ditch effort that just fell short.

The undrained-of upset climaxed another surprise - dealing blow earlier in the day.

Ronnie Going, of the Ottawa Gatineau Club, plastered a 5 and 3 shellacking on Doug Silverberg, last year Canada's junior champion and runner-up this year.

The McCormick upheaval was tinged with excitement at the finish. The Toronto golfer almost lost a three-up lead on the last four holes but had enough left at the 18th to halve that one and hang on to his slender margin.

Gerry Kesselring of Kitchener, Ont., will rate among the top contenders. So will several others who had byes today, including Phil Farley of Toronto Scarborough, runner-up in 1948 to Dick Chapman of the United States.

Walter McElroy of Vancouver, who can't be counted out in any championship competition, stayed in front of Roman Duchemin of Sydney, N.S., to win 2 and 1 today without too much trouble.
