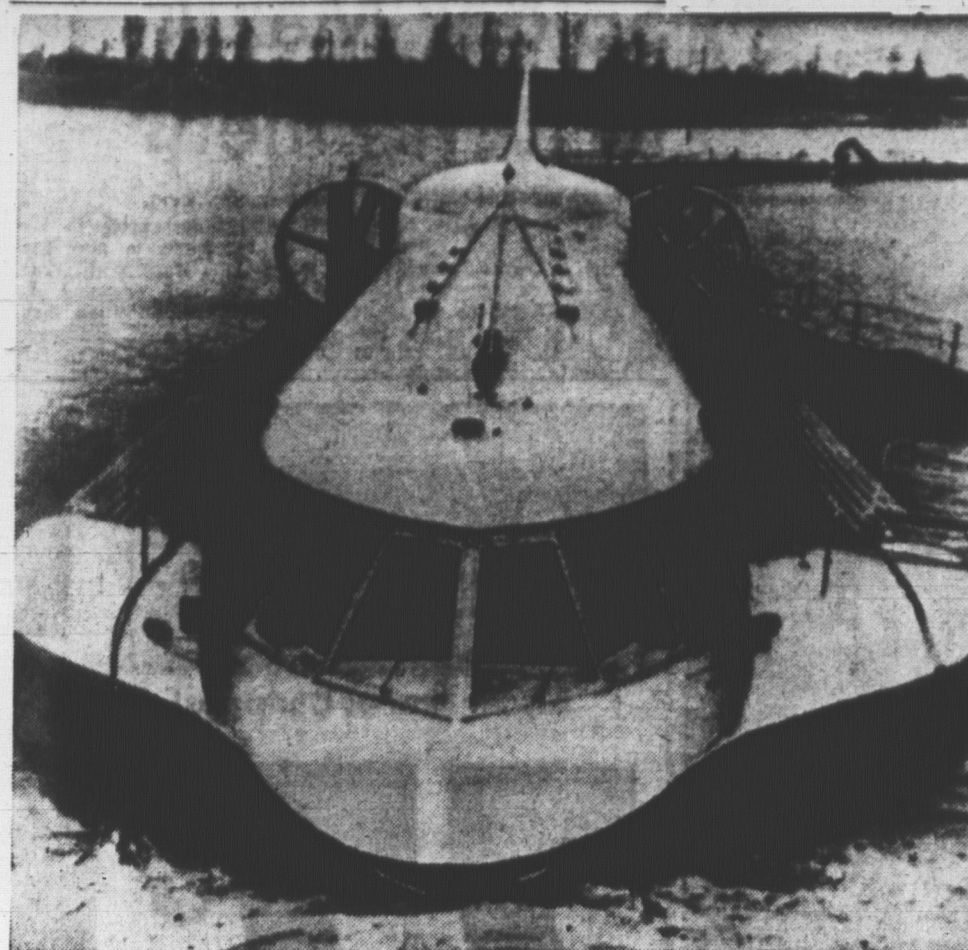


Greeting Rough For Cosmonauts

Platform Of Social Credit Is Revealed By Thompson

By BOB EXCELL. TORONTO (CP) — Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson announced a 10-point platform Tuesday hinged mainly on a pledge by all Social Credit candidates to give positive, responsible representation in Parliament even to the extent of non-partisanship.

Choosing a press conference to make public his platform, admittedly for reasons of assured press, radio and television coverage here, Mr. Thompson said Social Credit will offer a slate of about 100 candidates in the Nov. 8 federal election. He made no election promises for even if all Social Credit candidates were elected, the party would not have enough seats in the 265-seat house to form a majority government.

While a two-party system would be best for Canada, the parties must first present an alternative to each other, he said. Declaring that the two old parties are in trouble, he suggested they join with the New Democrats to form a left-wing party on one side, with Social Credit as a right-wing party on the other.

Among the specific proposals in the Social Credit platform were: Establishment of department of federal-provincial affairs, including a bureau of education; increased federal aid to education; major financial reforms, with the Bank of Canada empowered to provide money for government capital projects; reform of the national tax structure, and a two-price system for wheat.

But in the main, the planks in the party's platform were general ones. The first two of its 10 points are: 1. Responsible government — positive, responsible representation in a Parliament that will concern itself primarily with national and international affairs.

work with all members of Parliament, of all parties, so that the federal administration can carry on in a sound, responsible way." 2. National Interest — placing the country's interests above party considerations, including respect for the voters' choice of makeup of Parliament. This was a reference to minority governments. Mr. Thompson said there is no reason why a minority government cannot serve a full term. If it decided not to regard even minor defeats in the House, such as on Speaker's rulings, as defeats of the government itself, it could be maintained in power. After a minor defeat the government could call for a vote of confidence. It would resign only after being beaten in a major money vote or a non-confidence vote. Mainly Ottawa needs leadership, Mr. Thompson said. "Any provincial premier, if he could provide as strong an administration in Ottawa as he's doing in his own province, could give us a better government than we have now."

DIDN'T MENTION CRIME. The Social Credit leader made no reference to scandal or crime in his written platform. To make crime an election issue was to cover up the real issues, he said. "The prime minister has just as much right to a claim of morality and integrity as anybody else who is making these allegations." Nevertheless, Mr. Thompson called on the government to launch an inquiry into both the internal and external security of Canada, and to publish a white paper giving its results.
