**Minister Takes
Labrador Post**

HAPPY VALLEY. Labrador (CP)—A minister who was impressed 21 years ago by the sincerity of the Labrador people has had his request for a transfer to a charge here approved by the United Church of Canada.

Rev. W. C. Sellars, his wife and two teen-age daughters, arrived here Aug. 2 to begin duties in the town built beside a United States Air Force base and RCMP station Goose Bay. Mr. Sellars, a native Newfoundlander, served with the RCMP at Goose Bay during the Second World War and developed what he calls his "great admiration" for the people. He says his decision to return was inspired by a single incident during his tour of duty.

He said he was a member of the crew of a Norwegian aircraft dispatched to look for the survivors of a crashed RCMP plane. He began to form on the search plane's wings and they were forced down in the interior of Labrador in a blizzard.

Mr. Sellars said they were trapped by two trappers who built fires and kept them warm throughout the night until they could be brought out the next morning.

"These men expected nothing and they asked for nothing. I was impressed by their attitude."

**Activities Of
Ontario Probe
To Be Mined**

TORONTO (CP)—Premier Robarts said he will appoint a one-man royal commission to investigate events during the last few weeks concerning Windfall Oil and Mine Limited property in the Timmins-Ontario area.

In a statement from Jasper Park Alta., where he is attending the premiers' conference, and released here, the premier said the commissioner will be a member of the judiciary and will investigate, examine and probe into all the events of the last few weeks, which will include stock market speculations and activities.

Windfall suffered a spectacular collapse on the stock market last week following news of a worthless assay on the first drill hole at its holdings near Timmins.

Speculators gambled more than \$1,000,000 a day in Windfall since a rumor July 6 that a valuable base metal strike had been made on its claims four miles from the \$2,000,000, 600 copper-silver-zinc strike by Texas Gulf Sulphur Company.

The rumors sent the stock from a March low of 31 cents to a high of \$5.60 this month. It closed at 76 cents Tuesday, 26 cents down on the day.

**Ted Kennedy's
Spirits High,
Report Shows**

BOSTON (AP)**—He lies in the steel frame, face down, about half the day.

In that position, he can feed himself, shave, read and write. He can lift his head and his legs. When he tires of being on his stomach, the rotatable frame (and aide calls it "the rotisserie") is given a half-turn so that he is on his back.

Recently, he started working on a major objective—planning the election campaign in which he can't appear, personally.

Edward M. (Teddy) Kennedy, 32, lives for the day when, if his hopes are realized, he can walk again into the U.S. Senate. He is up for re-election as Massachusetts senator in November and he will have a Republican opponent, Howard Whittemore, Jr., Boston investment counselor.

Kennedy has a broken back, suffered in a June 19 airplane crash in which the pilot and a Kennedy aide were killed.

At the moment, his doctors are watching to see whether the broken vertebrae will knit naturally. The latest examination brought hopeful signs. Kennedy could be back on his feet by the end of the year, he believes. If not, an operation will be necessary and complete recovery would be delayed.

KEEPS OCCUPIED
Meanwhile, the younger brother of the late President John F. Kennedy keeps busy.

"His spirits are very high," says his wife, Joan. "He can work now and he likes that. He really gets a lot done in a day."

The room opposite Kennedy's has been converted into an office and two aides work there. For pleasure, Kennedy reads or watches television by means of a system of glass prisms that reflect the image.

He is preoccupied with thoughts of the November election. To an aide, he remarked recently:

"I want to win on my own, not on a sympathy vote."

ENGINE DEDICATED
REGINA (CP)—A 45-year-old steam locomotive has been dedicated by the Plains Historical Museum Society in Saskatchewan province. The engine, built in Montreal, made its last trip in April, 1960, from Swan River, Man., to Regina.

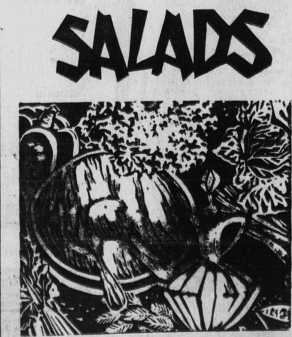

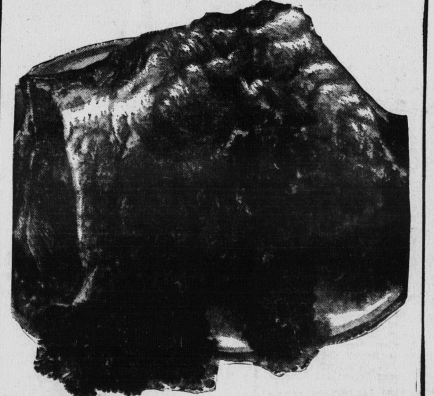
