## Dunk River Dairying Company Of Bedeque Has Interesting History

The Dunk River Dairying Company of Bedeque is probably the oldest business of its kind in the Province.

The factory of the Dunk River Dairying Company was built by Fenton T. Newberry in 1883 for the purpose of cheese-making. For some years the business was carried on by Mr. Newberry under a contract with the patrons whereby he was paid a flat rate for manufacturing and marketing the cheese.

In 1892 a committee of the patrons was appointed with a view to reorganizing along what is now known as co-operative lines. Its efforts met with success and in 1893 the company was incorporated under special act—necessary capital having been subscribed by a number of the prominent farmers within the district.

At the end of the first year as an incorporated company Colin Wright, who was the first Secretary, retired and the position was taken over by William Calbeck. On his retirement at the end of fifty years service a presentation was made to Mr. Calbeck couple with an address paying tribute to him as the guiding force throughout the years in establishing the business on so firm a basis with regard to both its financial standing and its integrity.

He was succeeded by his son, Ralph Calbeck, who was followed by Lt.-Col. U. G. Dawson, V.D., and by the present secretary, Major John S. Wright, E.D.

Unique Record  
C. M. Johnson, buttermaker, has an unique record in the Dairying Company since 1908. His assistant, O. G. Johnson, has also served continuously since 1919.

It is worthy of note that Mr. Johnson has been given undisturbed top honors officially ever since there has been any type of butter grading in this Province. In recent years a competition has been carried on under the auspices of the Dairymen's Association and Mr. Johnson has every year won the award for the highest percentage of first grade butter.

While the Dunk River Dairying Company is not organized as a co-operative business, its functions are on a co-operative basis in every respect. From the early days of its inception this policy was carried out. Patrons were encouraged to become stockholders until now practically every farmer sending cream to the factory holds stock in the company. Original stock is held by sons and grandsons and cream produced on many farms of the district has been delivered regularly every year since 1883. As an example, Nelson Inman of Central Bedeque was the first patron to deliver his cream to the factory on the morning that Prince Edward Island and his son, T. J. Inman, sent his cream to the factory this morning.

A feed department is operated at cost and patrons are able to purchase their feed requirements against returns for butterfat. This has developed into a sizeable business and works in such a way as to enable all to have the benefit of quantity buying.

## Modernization Of Dunk River Plant About Complete

Yesterday was a red letter day at the Dunk River Dairying Company factory at Bedeque when members of the company and invited guests gathered for the putting into operation of a new moulding and wrapping machine. Over the past several years a program has been in effect of modernizing the plant by the installation of new machinery and with this equipment the project is about complete.

The machine is known as the Blanchet moulding and wrapping machine and present for the occasion was the inventor himself, Mr. H. Blanchet of Drummondville, Que., who arranged the installation and saw that it was properly set up and working efficiently.

For the benefit of those present a batch of butter was moulded and wrapped. The bulk butter is simply inserted at the top and comes out wrapped in the new type one pound prints which are very neat and hand sized packages. It operates at the rate of 1500 pounds an hour and is so controlled that if something goes wrong, such as a wrapper getting caught, the whole operation stops.

With this new machine the butter comes direct from the churn instead of having to go into cold storage first thus saving time and labor.

## R.C.A.F. Station Takes On New Look

The R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, is gradually taking on an entirely new look. The old drab effect caused by the many unpainted buildings is disappearing under a coating of white. A contract has been let to Dougall Co. Ltd. of Toronto to paint all the buildings on the station and the work has commenced, starting with the buildings nearest the gate. They are all to be painted white with a green trim and already a vast improvement in the general appearance of the station is apparent.

Coupled with the painting a landscaping program is in effect. The grounds adjoining all the buildings are to be beautified with the planting of flowers, shrubs and hedges. This has already commenced with the grounds in front of headquarters building making a very pleasing effect. The area surrounding the Fire Department building has always been kept attractive and continues to be so. The main flag staff was recently moved from the old park square to in front of headquarters building and is set in a miniature park which when completed will make a fine setting for the R.C.A.F. emblem.

The cost of the landscaping is being borne by the non-public funds of the station such as mess.
