DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

A Division on Mills' Motion.

The Government Majority 45.

OTTAWA, April 8.

In the House of Commons, during the discussion on Mills' motion that Canada should negotiate her own treaties, speeches were made by Foster, Mills and Laurier, after which the motion was put to the vote and lost, 61 members voting for the motion and 106 against it.

Newfoundland Question

Startling Correspondence.

OTTAWA, April 8.

Further correspondence of an important and even startling character on the Newfoundland question has been presented to Parliament. Lord Knutsford's despatch proposing a conference in London was dated February 11. In this despatch Lord Knutsford made the startling intimation that unless negotiations between the United States and Canada result in a satisfactory manner, it may be that the Imperial Government will have to reconsider its decision with respect to assenting to the Blaine-Bond treaty. In Lord Stanley's reply of March 3rd, he says that Canada can only obtain similar terms to those of Newfoundland by agreeing to discrimination against Great Britain. After giving Lord Knutsford further pointers, Lord Stanley reminds him that the Dominion Government had not been informed of any change of opinion on the part of Her Majesty's Government as to the value of principle; that in negotiations with foreign countries the interest of Great Britain and of imperial possessions should be kept in view by those to whom might be entrusted the duty of taking a share in such negotiations. At this point the correspondence ends.

Throwing off the Mask.

SOREL, Que., April 8.

Mr. Laurier's organs in this Province are one by one throwing off the mask and openly advocating annexation to the United States. Le Sud, of this town, which is supposed to be controlled by Beauclerc and Lafontaine, M. P.'s, Laurier's leading supporters in the Commons from the Montreal district, is the latest to come out, and openly declares that Confederation must be smashed, and political union to the neighboring republic is the only remedy.

A Commercial Lawsuit.

NEW YORK, April 8.

In a suit brought by the City National Bank against the commercial agency of R. G. Dun & Co., the bank recovered \$5,204 lost on a draft discounted for W. A. Kittis, on alleged false representation concerning their financial standing furnished by Dun & Co's commercial agency. The jury returned a verdict for the full amount claimed, with interest.

The Redistribution Bill.

OTTAWA, April 8.

The Redistribution Bill will positively be brought down this session. As far as possible the present constituencies will be left intact. The largest caucus of Liberal-Conservative members since the general election of 1874 convened yesterday. It was a friendly gathering of old and new members.

A Wife-Murderer Arrested.

LAWRENCE, MASS., April 8.

Eno, the worthless wretch who brutally murdered his wife here the other day, has been arrested.

Sir Arthur Sullivan Suffering.

LONDON, April 8.

Sir Arthur Sullivan, the distinguished musician is suffering from renal calculus at Monte Carlo.
