THE PROVISION MARKET.

Chicago Easier—Lard Lower and Bacon Higher in Liverpool—Montreal Steady.

In Montreal a fair trade is reported in provisions, there being a better demand for all lines, and the market on the whole is moderately active and firm. We quote: Canadian pork, \$15.50 to \$16.00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, at 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c; and compound, refined, at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb.; hams, 11 1/2c to 12c; bacon, 12c per lb.

There was an easier feeling in the Chicago provision market and prices for pork declined 7 1/2c to 10c, closing \$10.85 April; \$10.85 May; \$11.05 July. Lard closed 2 1/2c to 5c lower at \$5.47 1/2 May; \$5.57 1/2 July; \$5.65 September. Short ribs closed \$5.40 April; \$5.40 May; \$5.50 July.

In the Liverpool provision market lard declined 3d and heavy bacon scored another advance of 6d. Pork closed at 53s 9d; lard, 28s 9d; bacon, 33s 6d to 34s 6d, and tallow, 19s 6d.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

Cheese Firm and Butter Recovers From Yesterday's Prices.

The Montreal Gazette reports: The cheese market naturally was firm as a result of the large transactions reported yesterday. The cable also made another advance of 6 to 4 1/2c for colored cheese, while white rules firm.

Butter seems to have touched bottom for the time being, the presence of exporters in the market who were attracted at the low prices having helped to check the decline. In fact creamery sold for 16 1/2c today, in fair sized lots, and this would have been impossible, at the beginning of the week, and we quote 16c to 19c as a nominal range.

Lobster packers are busily preparing for the coming season. Several new factories have been erected, which proves that there must be money in lobster packing.

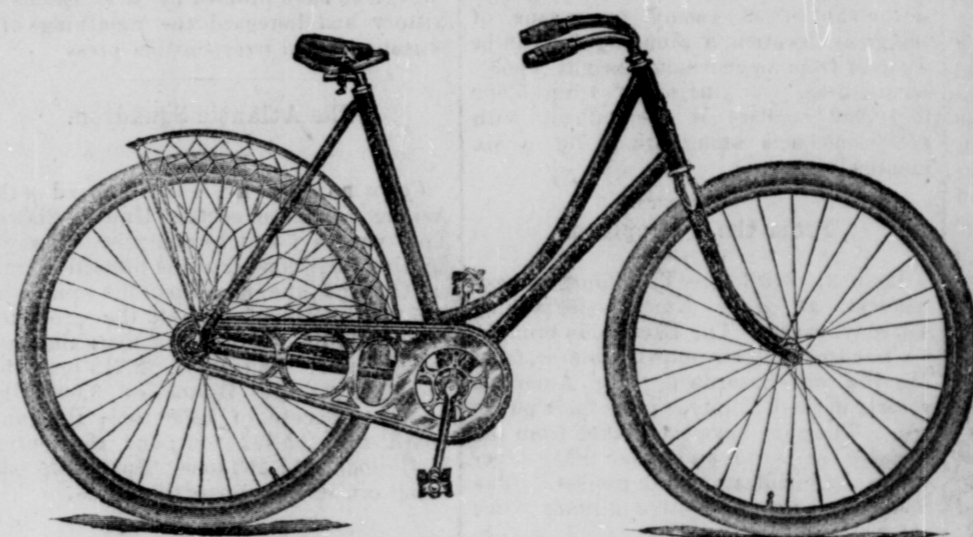

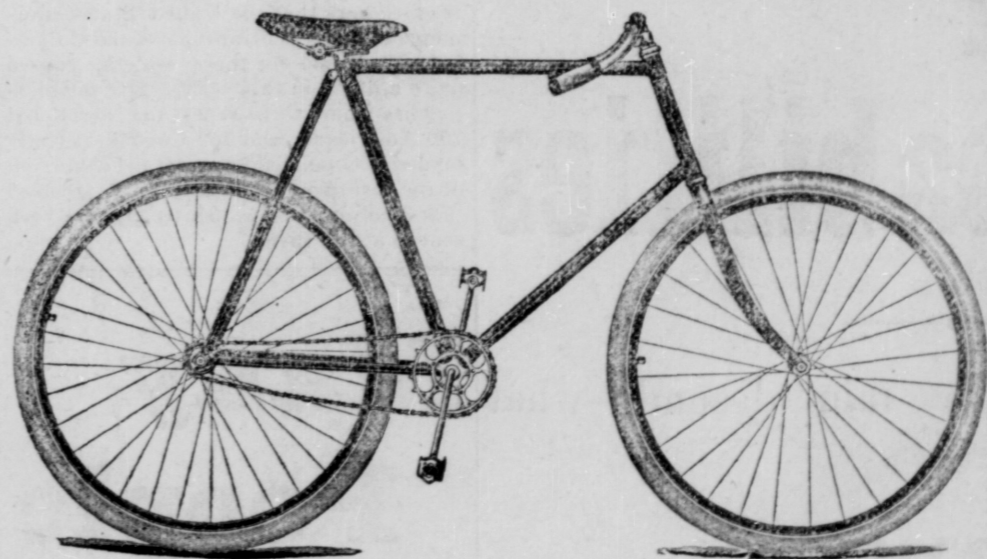
