### Central Bedeque Incorporates

Fifty-six out of eighty-one eligible voters or over 60 per cent cast ballots in the Central Bedeque area on Thursday, Oct. 3, 1966 to determine whether or not Central Bedeque would become incorporated, under the Village Service Act, of 1954. The results of this vote were thirty-nine in favor of incorporation and seventeen against.

The voting was conducted under the supervision of Mr. Vernon L. Moase, Sheriff of Prince County, acting as returning officer and he was assisted by Florie Green who acted as clerk.

The scrutineers of the voting were Mr. Fred T. Arsenault and Mr. Benjamin Riley.

The chairman of YUS at St. Dunstan's is Leo Broderick and faculty advisor is Fr. James Kelly, who also is chairman of the sub-committee on national affairs of World University Service of Canada.

### To Visit SDU Today

A visit to St. Dunstan's University, will be made on October 31, 1966, by Jill Stocker, Assistant Secretary of World University Service of Canada.

Miss Stocker was born in London, England, but has lived in eastern Canada since immigrating in 1952. She is a graduate of King's Hall, Compton, P.Q. and the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, N.B., where she was active in many organizations. She joined the staff of WUSC in Toronto as travelling secretary in June 1966, with special responsibility for universities in the Atlantic region and part of Ontario.

During her visit to St. Dunstan's, Miss Stocker will meet with members of the WUSC committee, student council, and all interested students.

She will discuss topics such as the international aid program of World University Service; the WUSC Centennial Project, for which students and professors from overseas will tour Canada in the summer of 1967; and the forthcoming visit of the "Treasure Van" to St. Dunstan's.

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### Oyster Bed Bridge Child Drowns

Three-year-old Marjorie Catherine Dalziel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Charles Dalziel of Oyster Bed Bridge, was the victim of a drowning accident when she fell into a nearby cess pool.

The mishap occurred at approximately 4:10 Saturday afternoon near her home.

The child was found by her aunt, Mrs. Joyce Hitchcock, also of Oyster Bed Bridge. Dr. K.G. Ellis of Hunter River pronounced the child dead at the scene of the accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Dalziel lived formerly at Park Street in Charlottetown.

### Ch'town Minister Leaving

The Assistant Minister and Director of Christian Education at Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, Rev. Gerald G. Wywas, BA, BD, has asked for a change of Pastoral Relations to take effect on June 30th, 1967. He has been accepted by Andover Newton Theological School as a candidate for a Master of Sacred Theology, ST.M., in Pastoral Counseling. Andover Newton is the oldest Protestant graduate school of Theology in the United States.

It is affiliated with Boston University, School of Theology and Harvard Divinity School. Mr. Wywas was born in Inverness, N.S. He is a graduate in Arts from Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., and holds a Bachelor of Divinity, from Pine Hill Divinity Hall in Halifax, N.S.

He came to the Island in June of 1960 and was minister of Winsloe Pastoral Charge before coming to Trinity in July 1962. He and his wife, the former Ethel M. Bowman, R.N., and three children, Margaret, David and Lynn will move to the Boston area next July.

Trinity Official Board has granted his request for a change and after action by the higher courts of the church a successor will be called to Trinity.

### Judge Arsenault Receives Honor

Hon. A.E. Arsenault of Charlottetown, retired Judge of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island and one of the early national presidents of the National Acadian Society, was recognized yesterday for his keen interest and promotion of this society over the years when Dr. Leon Richard of Moncton, the national president, presented him with the gold medal of the Order of Acadian Identity, the highest award given by this society.

The citation which accompanied the award gave an outline of Judge Arsenault's career and made reference to the fact that when he was the national president, he and Rev. Andre Cormier, then of St. Joseph's University, were the first to visit and make contact with their fellow Acadians in Louisiana — a contact which has since proved to be fruitful and mutually beneficial.

Accompanying Dr. Richard to Charlottetown for this presentation and to attend the annual meeting of L'Assomption Society at Egmont Bay in the afternoon, were, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Alderic Melanson, Gilbert Finn and Elphege Levasseur, all of Moncton.

Others present for the ceremony which took place at Judge Arsenault's residence yesterday morning were Dr. Henri Blanchard, J. Elmer and Mrs. Blanchard, Francis Blanchard, and J. Edmond Arsenault who is a vice-president of the National Acadian Society, and Mrs. Arsenault, all of Charlottetown.

The town council has appointed five special police constables to work through the night with and under the direction of town policeman Charles Jackson, this force will patrol the town in three vehicles.
