Jets Use Rocket Fire In Gulf

BAHREIN, Persian Gulf (Reuters)—RAF jet fighters pounded a mud fort with rocket fire 12 times Wednesday in the first air offensive against a rebellion in the tiny Arab state of Oman.
An RAF spokesman said the raids caused "severe damage" to the rebel-held fort of Izki, 10 miles from the Oman capital of Nizwa. Nizwa is the stronghold of the Imam of Oman, leading a rebellion against the British-backed sultan of Muscat and Oman, ruler of an independent state on the tip of the Arabian peninsula.

Peace Pilgrim Speaks in Ch'town

A small but appreciative audience last night listened to Peace Pilgrim at Hertz Memorial Hall as she unfolded her formula for inner peace and harmony one with another.
She stressed the point that by obedience to the laws of God one can attain inner peace. "So many of us believe these things but it is a matter of application," she said.
Peace Pilgrim started her pilgrimage for peace about 15 years ago but has been on her walking mission for four and a half years. Believing that good can overcome evil she gave some very vivid descriptions of the applications of this principle. Often she has been asked the question "don't you carry anything for protection, aren't you afraid in some of the loneliest places in which you travel?" Her answer to such a question is that since fear is caused by something evil that may happen and since she never expects anything but good to happen, she has nothing to fear. Her only weapon of defence is love, she stated.

Build Fumigating Chamber To Disinfect Potato Bags

The construction of a fumigating chamber for disinfecting potato bags to be located on the Railway Wharf at Summerside begins today and will be erected by the M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd.
The building 17 x 18.6 is to be built on piles near the present warehouses and will be of cork insulation. The plant will provide a service that is expected to practically eliminate potato diseases on P.E.I. At present the Province through various types of precautions is almost disease free. The project is the result of recommendations to the Department of Public Works by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught.

Mobile Biological Laboratory Will Check On Eating Places

The Mobile Biological Laboratory of the Department of National Health and Welfare has arrived in Charlottetown to augment the work of the Division of Sanitation, Provincial Department of Health, it was announced by Dr. Lorne Bonnell, Minister of Health. The Laboratory is on Prince Edward Island at the request of the minister.
The chief task of the Mobile Unit this summer is to inspect and report on all eating establishments in the National Park and outlying areas which accommodate heavy tourist trade. It is expected that the Laboratory will be in the Province for a month. While here, the Lab will work in close co-operation with the local Division of Sanitary Engineering under H. Giles Cantwell, Chief Sanitary Inspector. Dr. Al Larner, Bacteriologist with the Department of National Health and Welfare, is in charge of the Unit. John Kelly is laboratory technician.
The bus houses a complete bacteriological laboratory unit and has been on the Island every summer since it went into operation in 1951. In 1956 a survey was performed at Montague and vicinity on shell fish conditions.
Following completion of these surveys, the Lab results will be sent to Dr. Bonnell, and recommendations will be carried out by the Dept. of Health.
Heretofore, Dr. Bonnell pointed out, the tourist inspection work was carried out largely by the Provincial Division of Sanitary Engineering. However, due to an expanded programme by the Division over the years and lack of qualified staff, it was felt that the Prince Edward Island Department could not handle the Summer Tourist areas in addition to its present commitments. Fortunately, these services by the Federal Government have been available for several years and we have been able to make previous use of them here, the Minister said.
If time permits, an inspection of eating establishments in Charlottetown and Summerside will also be carried out by the Mobile Lab, Dr. Bonnell concluded.
