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Prince County Boy Scouts Break Camp

The Prince County Cub camp broke up on Monday evening, which brought to a successful conclusion the camp for Scouts at the farm of Harrison MacFarlane, Fernwood. The Scouts were very grateful for the loan of the camp site and the many kindnesses extended to them by Mr. MacFarlane.

There were 21 Cubs representing Borden, Summerside, 1st and 2nd packs. The boys were in camp five days.

Leaders were Camp Chief S. A. Hopper, assisted by Jack MacCarville, George MacNeill, Miss Margaret Wedge and Roland Ostway.

The previous week the Scouts had 96 grounds when 40 Scouts attended. The Scouts were from Tignish, Alberton, Borden, and Summerside. Certain Scouts tests were passed by the boys. Camp fires were held each night and badges earned. Overnight hikes were a feature of the outing. The boys cooked their own breakfast and supper. Leaders were Chief Hopper, Rev. Meeting Of Summerside Town Council

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday evening. Mayor Campbell presiding. Bills were passed as follows: Town paid bills \$1663.06; unpaid \$898.20. Electric light paid bills \$989.22; unpaid \$1,405.88. The report of the Finance Committee showed the town's expenditure well within the estimates with the exception of the abattoir which showed an increase. After some discussion it was decided to look into the matter of running the abattoir to see if expenses could be cut down.

It was decided to lay some shore gravel on North Market Street, as the street was in bad condition.

A police report showed 34 arrests for drunkenness, 2 for vagrancy, 3 for speeding. Fines and costs amounted to \$203.00. 18 herds had been inspected by Dr. Cunningham and Chief White. This included 207 animals. The report showed improved conditions for housing cattle and bottling milk. Some discussion arose regarding laying tiles for drainage on Duke Street.

Coun. Mollison stated that he understood that the Federal and Provincial Governments would provide the means for such work as an unemployment project. It was decided to enquire into the matter.

After some discussion on the airport the meeting adjourned.—S.
