May Establish New Plant At Kensington

Possibility of establishing an industry at Kensington for the manufacture of floor machines for sanding and polishing is being considered by Mr. Jack A. Campbell, of Wollaston, Mass., a well-known former Islander now vacationing here.
Mr. Campbell manufactured floor machines successfully for many years in Massachusetts and is now retired from active business. He sees possibilities of developing the industry in this Province, however, and would be prepared to start a small factory here as an experiment if adequate electrical power can be obtained. The extension of a high tension line now under way by the Maritime Electric Company would, he believes, meet this requirement.
In the meantime, Mr. Campbell is enjoying his annual vacation at his summer home in Kensington with his wife, the former Miss Katherine Stewart, who is also a native Islander. He believes Prince Edward Island has a wonderful future, and that every effort should be made to put its highways in first class condition.

Many Improvements At S'ide R. C. A. F. Station

A new deal has been given the man in the ranks and at R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside. They now have the luxury of two-bed cubicles in their barracks which gives a measure of privacy not hitherto known. This is all part of a long range plan which at this station is nearing completion. For many months after the end of the war Summerside Station was dormant and then word came that he station was to be re-opened as a permanent peace-time air navigation training base.
This meant that buildings which had been originally built on a temporary basis were now to become permanent installations. The M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. has from that time until the present day had the contracts for most of the rehabilitation work that has been done.

The final contract awarded to Schurman's called for the partitioning off of the large barrack rooms into semi-private cubicles with each cubicle servicing two airman. Each room is separated from the other by a storage wall with two common hallways running the full length of the building with a solid partition between. The storage wall contains three different compartments. One is a wardrobe, another is made up of open shelves above and a private locker with lock below. The third section has open shelving above, large spacious drawers in the centre and below a desk has been built in complete with drawers. The top of the desk is so constructed as to allow it to be pulled out into the room when in use.
All the cubicle units were manufactured from fir plywood in the M. F. Schurman Company mill in three units and then transported to the site where they needed only to be bolted together to complete the job. In each of the three storey barracks there was built three lounges or card rooms. These rooms have been beautifully finished with striped plywood to dado height and the old style windows have been replaced with modern casement picture windows. - S.

First came the contract for the repair to the sub-floors of nearly all of the existing buildings with the exception of the hangars. This work was covered by three contracts and was carried out in different ways. Some of the buildings required concrete foundations to be placed under them. Other buildings were replaced completely from the sub-floors on down. This required in many cases carrying beams of concrete to replace the old wooden ones. Some called for new wood joists to be placed back on existing concrete piers. Finished concrete floors poured over cinder fill with asphalt tile coverings were employed in some buildings while others had aluminum coverings over wooden floors.
On three double-decker barrack blocks, all of the H design, the work was much more extensive. All of the wooden sub-structure was torn out and the buildings were placed on concrete foundations. The wooden joists were replaced with concrete beams and on top of these beams were laid pre-cast concrete slabs over which was poured a concrete topping. The floors were then finished with a pleasing color of asphalt tile. On the second floor of these buildings the floors were covered to receive the asphalt floor tiling. Up to now it was simple reconstruction but then came something more revolutionary. The barracks were to be completely changed inside. The toilets, washrooms, drying rooms and shower rooms were renovated into modern facilities. These rooms have been completed with grease proof asphalt tile floors in all of the above mentioned rooms with the exception of the shower rooms which have terrazo floors. The walls in these rooms to the dado height are covered with white glazed tile while the shower stalls themselves are of this material full height. The glazed tile is also to be found around the wash basins.

Miminegash In 13-12 Win Over Kinkora

In a baseball game on Sunday, July 29th at Miminegash, the Miminegash Royals scored a victory by defeating the Kinkora Red Sox by a narrow margin of 13-12.
The large crowd of fans on hand were doubtful of such a victory inasmuch as the Royals had lost their star pitcher, Aeneas Doucette, a few days ago when he moved to Toronto. Replacing him for the first seven innings was Vincent Ellsworth on the mound and for the last two innings Claude (Rusty) Callaghan cinched the game for the Royals.
The Red Sox used J. McCarville as their pitcher for the entire nine innings. In the opening inning on the second ball pitched to the catcher, Allison Farmer of the Red Sox scored the only home run of the game.
These two teams are members of the Prince County "B" League and have played wonderful ball during the season.
