

Housing Construction Discussed At Meeting

GEORGETOWN — The adjourned March 14th. meeting of the Georgetown Town Council was held in the Council Chambers on Monday night. The meeting was attended by Tom Sanderson, president of Bathurst Marine Ltd., who represented Bathurst Marine Ltd., and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., in discussing with the Council the question of housing for industrial workers in Georgetown.

The Council had made an earlier decision not to participate as a Municipality in housing construction. At Monday's meeting the matter was gone into at considerable length, and it is the opinion of the Council that, although a grant could possibly be obtained through government sources of a percentage of the costs of housing construction and also that a guaranteed rental could be obtained from industry on a number of units over a period of years to be decided upon by the parties, that the housing field is one in which the Council should not become involved if there is any possible means of home construction through private enterprise

or possibly some government agency. Figures have been obtained on the cost of materials and construction of fencing the Town Dump and this matter was left over to a future meeting to decide the best and most economical method to adopt. On the question of the application of the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation's application for an area of land, where the present units are being constructed and where it is hoped that more will be built in the future the Council moved that the Corporation be deemed an area of land measuring 336 feet by 165 feet, or half the area requested. The Council agreed to lease the remaining area for a period of two years with the understanding that at any time a need is shown that the additional land is necessary for additional units that the land would be then deemed to the Corporation. A number of other minor matters were discussed prior to the meeting being adjourned to March 30th.

Plans were made to hold the annual spring rally in Mt. Stewart on May 23rd. Names of speakers were suggested and a film strip will be shown by Roberta Shaw who will also lead a discussion following. Miss Shaw will lead the devotions at the close of the rally. It was announced that the students attending Ewart College the Presbyterian Church Deaconess Training School will be on a Maritime tour this spring and will be on the island the last day of April and the 1st day of May.

Hunger Project Is Concluded

The Mr. Hunger Project was started in Tracadie Cross twenty-one weeks ago. During this time each high school was to donate 21 hours towards the Cross work. Tracadie completed its 21 hours yesterday and as the highlight of the day they closed their project with the hanging of Mr. Hunger. Approximately 120 pupils attended the ceremony waving placards bearing quotations such as "We Hate Mr. Hunger", "Hunger Hurts" and "Let's Kill Him Quick". Before hanging Mr. Hunger, pupils smothered him with envelopes containing the money donated by the pupils and their parents. Approximately \$35 was raised for the project.

P.E.I. Guernseys Have Qualified

A number of Prince Edward Island Guernsey cows have qualified in record of performance tests listed in the current issue of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Journal.

Johndale Lady Jane produced 10,785 pounds milk, 528 butterfat for breed class averages of 132 milk, 129 fat for L.A. Semple, a Charlottetown druggist, whose farm is located at Winsloe. She is a mature cow.

A Semple three-year-old, Burlinghain Ginger produced 9,233 pounds milk, 445 fat for BCAs of 123 milk, 119 fat.

Maiden Hill Pamela, a four-year old cow owned by Mrs.

Mary Palmer and Sons, Kensington produced 10,433 pounds milk, 496 fat for BCAs of 136 and 129.

Golden View Rex's Tracy produced 8,811 pounds milk, 462 fat for BCAs of 126 milk, 132 fat for Roy Younker, Kingston as a two-year-old heifer. The current Journal also lists the unusual production of Mr. Semple's Waterlily Dianne's Glenda whose milk production of 16,609 pounds is rated the highest ever turned in by a Prince Edward Island cow on twice-a-day milking. Sprout Treatment Is Praised Highly

A treatment that will stop sprouting in potatoes being sold for tablestock was praised here last evening by R. L. Burge, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, after he and several Charlottetown dealers had talked to two men who are here introducing the product.

"Sprout-Nip" is the trade name for the product which stops sprouting of spuds at a cost of three cents per hundred pounds, if the cost of the applicator is included. The actual material costs two and three-quarter cents per hundred pounds of spuds, William E. Green, Toronto told The Guardian.

The material is applied to the potatoes just before they are packaged. The printed material with the product states sprouting will be prevented "for one year or more."

Mr. Burge said last evening this must come. The president of the Horticultural Council of Canada "said to me recently for example, you have the best potatoes in the world, what are you doing about sprouting?"

Complaints about sprouting will be more this year because of the unusually warm weather, Mr. Burge said. It's too late to do anything about it now, but it's important for the future, Mr. Burge emphasized.

Treston Bubar, Monticello, Maine, is in charge of the distribution in this province and New Brunswick.

He is planning a demonstration perhaps in a week's time, "but we could give demonstrations today", he and Mr. Green said, before we leave the province.

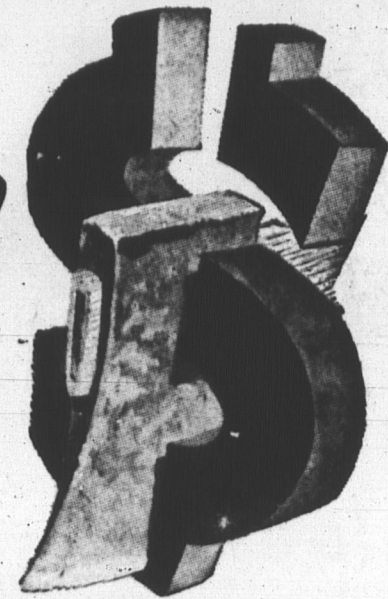
