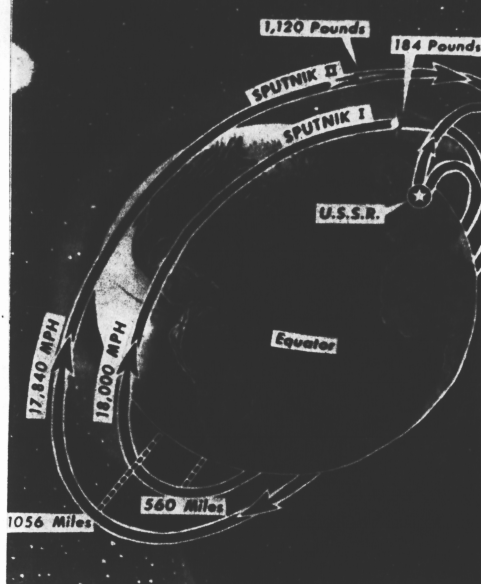

Sputnik II Over NS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (CP) — sharp-eyed observers in North America's dog-carrying satellite this morning before sunrise. Sputnik II will make its first pass of the East Coast at approximately 6 a.m. AST, from approximately 400 miles north of the lower end of Texas at 6:45 and at 6:47 will swing near Chicago and the Great Lakes area.

Sees New Radar Defences Required In Three Years

QUEBEC (CP)—Ground environment — an electronics network or "atmosphere" that automatically tracks flying objects and controls their interception—is the only weapon against Russian missiles, K. R. OTTAWA (CP) — Subpoenas were served on about 50 persons in Montreal, Toronto and Calgary Tuesday in connection with seizure in Toronto of documents in an income tax investigation involving possibly \$10,000,000, the Exchequer Court of Canada. Macmillan In Appeal For Tighter Anglo-U.S. Alliance

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Macmillan said Tuesday that the United States now realizes it can no longer stand alone at "the turning point in history." Macmillan urged in a new session of Parliament with an appeal for a tighter Anglo-American alliance to best "to meet together our efforts of better co-ordination — political, military, economic and moral." "At the moment the countries of the free world are superior in military resources, manpower and skill. But the free world has no central direction such as the communist power centers have. The president and I felt there was a need to get together our efforts of better co-ordination — political, military, economic and moral." "The American people," Macmillan told the House of Commons, "are no longer confident that even their great country can do everything itself, without allies to secure its own survival and still less to secure the survival of the ideals for which they stand." "The prime minister pictured the free world as under constant threat from the centrally-directed Communist powers. "I still believe that peaceful co-existence is possible and desirable. But I must frankly admit that we cannot count on the Soviet Government (the USSR) to do this."

Mayor Of New York Re-elected

NEW YORK (AP) — Mayor Robert F. Wagner, a Democrat, was re-elected Tuesday by a big margin over Republican Robert K. Christenbury who ran with the support of President Eisenhower. In other scattered-official elections throughout the U.S., Democratic Governor Robert B. Meyner built up an imposing lead in his bid for reelection as governor of traditionally Republican New Jersey. Mayor Malcolm S. Forbes, Democrat, J. Lindsay Almond Jr. won election as governor of Virginia under the banner of mass resistance to racial integration in public schools. He defeated Republican Ted Dalton who campaigned for moderation on the school issue. Socialist Jasper McLevy, mayor of Bridgeport, Conn., since 1953, was defeated in his bid for a third term by city Judge Samuel J. Tedesco, a Democrat.

Amendment Expected To PEI Law Re Pensions Plan

May Expand Arms Commission

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (IP) The United States and Russia were reported Tuesday night to have agreed to a plan under which the United Nations disarmament commission would be increased by 10 members. U. S. Satellite Firing Rumored

NEW YORK (AP) — The Mutual Broadcasting System said Tuesday it has been reliably informed that the United States will launch its first satellite next week. In Washington, however, a spokesman for the U.S. satellite project, Vanguard, denied any such speed in launching plans. He said the project still stands as previously announced — a launch in December and a satellite to be launched next March. The network, in a coast-to-coast radio broadcast, said its Philadelphia news bureau had been informed that the launching of a "leading satellite," described as the "first of a series of satellites" was not further identified.

New Mystery Object Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — A brilliant mystery object was reported by a coast guard cutter, even as the air force investigated a flurry of earlier similar reports. The coast guard cutter Sebago, cruising in the Gulf of Mexico about 200 miles south of Louisiana, radioed that an object resembling "a brilliant plane with a high rate of speed" was seen for about three seconds at 7:21 a.m. AST. The Sebago's message said the object was tracked on the vessel's radar screen for 27 minutes and disappeared during that period. The object fitted on and off the screen several times. Sightings of strange objects have been reported from widely scattered sections of the U.S. since Sunday, most of them near secret military installations in the southwest.

Recout Today In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal's first two judicial recouts in a majority election has been ordered by Judge Antoine Lamarre to start today. He granted petitions from both Jean Drapeau, defeated incumbent, and Paul Venais, a private citizen, by a couple of hostile arguments against the two men. Both recouts will proceed at the same time before the same judge. That makes a total of 12 recouts arising from the Oct. 28 civic election in which Senator Sarto Fournier was elected mayor.

Will Celebrate On Moon In 1967, Red Prediction

MOSCOW (AP) — With bigwigs of the Communist world flocking to Moscow for the party's 40th anniversary jubilee, Soviet papers blossomed Tuesday with predictions of Soviet rockets to the moon, to Mars, to Venus. One scientist envisioned the crews of space ships propelling themselves with rocket pistols out where gravity disappears. I. Isakov, a Stalin prize winner in biological science, said he believed it possible that the 50th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution "will be celebrated on the moon just as we are now celebrating the 40th on our planet." Another, T. Khachaturov, said he believed it possible that super-fuel which kicked the two Sputniks into space and had injected the rockets into their paths around the earth. The super-fuel presumably was the new source of power the Russians Monday said had made the Soviet mission to the U.S.S.R. possible. Western scientists have been speculating whether the new source of power was atomic energy or nuclear fusion. Khachaturov said it also had been proposed to create an "electronic brain which could control the movement of the rocket's movement before it entered its orbit."

MAKING POING WELL

Moosville, Laika, the furry dog crammed in a cubicle of Sputnik II for its 17,840 m.p.h. spin through space, was reported in good shape. But Soviet writers seemed to be preparing her epitaph as a sacrifice to science. They hinted that the scientists do not expect Laika to parachute back to earth. The Soviet Union's top ranking doctor, A. N. Bakulev, president of the Academy of Medical Sciences, gave the verdict on Laika. He studied recordings and reports from Sputnik II which has been circling the earth for three days at altitudes up to more than 1,600 miles. Radio reports from instruments attached to the dog showed its pulse and breathing within normal limits. It was said. Irina Volk in the Literary Gazette indicated that Laika will be Laika's flying coffin. She told of Laika's "grand flying men" and how she was taken care of when she was shot out in space, and the inscription "To an unknown hero of our time, the Soviet physician, Ivan Pavlov."

Russian Trade Mission Coming

OTTAWA (CP) — A new Soviet trade delegation is expected to arrive in Canada later this month under Russian orders to help up trade with this country. Soviet embassy officials here said Tuesday the group will be led by a certain "Mr. Gromov" and will be "widely representative" of various Soviet trading firms. The group may make deals not only to sell Russian goods but also to buy certain Canadian goods, the officials said.

End Firing On Diesel Hearings
