Australia Stretches Lead Over South Africa To 7

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Australia stretched its lead to seven strokes over South Africa Friday, but rallying British and American teams battled back into contention in the second round of the Eisenhower Trophy amateur golf tournament.

The Australian two-day total of 455 left them seven strokes ahead of South Africa at 442, while Britain and the United States moved into third place with a total of 443 each.

NEW YORK (AP)—Canada, shut out last year, won its third international jumping event at the national horse show Friday and went ahead of the powerful United States squad in the team standings.

The victory, achieved by Gall Ross of Edmonton on The Hood, Tom Gayford of Gormley, Ont., on Mapleigh and Jim Elder of Aurora, Ont., aboard Royal Actress, gave the Canadians 57 points in the race for the team title.

Nothing At Stake But EFC Promises Excitement

Weekend action in the Eastern Football Conference will have no effect on the standings, but to hear the four head coaches, everybody will be going all out.

The final standings in the four-team conference have already been decided with Ottawa in first place followed by Hamilton Tiger-Cats, Montreal Alouettes and Toronto Argonauts.

The clubs close out the schedule with Toronto playing at Hamilton Saturday and Ottawa playing host to the Alouettes Sunday. Saturday's game starts at 2 p.m. EDT and will be televised on the CBC eastern net-

work while Sunday's contest begins at 2 p.m. EST and will be carried on the CTV eastern network.

Ottawa's first-place finish earned them a bye next weekend while Montreal plays at Hamilton Nov. 6 in a sudden-death semi-final. The winner meets Ottawa in a two-game eastern final Nov. 12 and Nov. 19.

Meanwhile, the four coaches are looking no further ahead than this weekend, and each with good reason.

Ralph Sazio, boss of the Tiger-Cats, says his players are "not gonna horse around."

Hamilton has been beaten once by Montreal this season and they know the Alouettes are capable of pulling another upset.

Frank Clair of Ottawa is hoping Moe Racine will win the individual scoring race, but this is not uppermost in his mind. "We want to win this game, not just kick field goals," says Clair.

The Riders possess an 11-3 record and were not ecstatic over losing 35-12 to the cellar-dwelling Argos last week.

The game in Hamilton will be Toronto's final showing of the 1966 season and coach Bob Shaw would like to win at least one more game. A victory would leave the Argos with a 5-9 record.

"We're going to try our damndest to win," says Shaw, whose club has shown the ability to win at times throughout the year.

And Darrell Mudra of Montreal wants a victory to give the Alouettes a 500 record in Montreal for the first time since 1958.

SCRAMBLE TO SCORE The highlight of the weekend will be the scoring race with any one of three players in position to come out on top.

Racine leads the scorers with 71 points, five more than Montreal's Peter Kempf. And Don Sutherland, who won the scoring title last season by beating out Racine, is in third spot with 64 points.

The Tiger-Cats and the Alouettes are free of any major injuries. Sazio plans no lineup changes but Mudra is hoping to use fullback J. W. Lockett for the first time since the season opener, when he broke his arm. The Argos will be without Dave Still, out with torn knee ligaments requiring surgery. But they've recalled defensive tackle Walt Balasak who was released earlier this season.

Clair would like to rest some regulars and experiment with second-stringers. But halfback Rick Black is out of the lineup with an injured knee and Clair will have to make some lineup changes.

Buckpasser Favored For Aqueduct Cup

NEW YORK (AP)—It is 1-3 that Buckpasser, thoroughbred racing's youngest millionaire, will post his 12th straight victory and add \$71,825 to his bankroll today by winning the two miles of the Jockey Club Gold Cup at Aqueduct.

Six other horses, including stablemate Poker, were named Friday for the long journey. But the track handicapper couldn't even get a glimpse of the others in preparing the advance line. With seven starters, the 49th running of the Gold Cup will be worth \$110,500.

Ogden Phipps' great three-year-old, unbeaten since bowing to a stablemate in his 1965 debut, goes into the race with earnings of \$1,157,049.

Buckpasser and Poker, owned by Mrs. H. C. Phipps-Wheatley Stable, and Reginald Webster's Belmont Stakes winner Amberold will carry 119 pounds each. The older horses — Narkos, O'Hara, Moonrrip and All Wise — will pack 124 each.
