In another vote for a slightly lower market, the Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped 4 to 334.9.

Volume was 3,500,000 shares compared with 3,500,000 Tuesday.

A factor cited by analysts as depressing was the huge secondary offering of 2,819,000 shares of General Motors stock valued at approximately \$284,000,000. This is quite a lot of investment money to sop upon an ordinary business day.

As it developed, however, General Motors gained 1/4 at 191 and was the only one of the leading motor stocks to post a gain. Ford lost 1/4 while Chrysler, American Motors and Studebaker all closed unchanged.

Among the 15 most active stocks, gainers and losers were even at seven each while Polaroid closed unchanged.

The most active stock, Erie Lackawanna backed away from recent gains and declined 1/4 to 8 1/4 on 106,200 shares.

International Nickel gained 2 points among Canadian issues traded while Distillers Secagrams rose 1/2 and Dome Mines 1/4. Walker-Gooderham fell 1/4 and Canadian Pacific and Hudson Bay mining 1/4 apiece.

Prices were irregularly lower on the American Exchange. Volume was 1,600,000 shares compared with 1,600,000 Tuesday. Canadian Javelin gained 1/2 point. Scurry Raincoats, 1/4 and Jupiter Corp. 1/4. Brazilian traction lost 1/4 and Canadian Marconi 1/4.

NOTICE

WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS

Effective midnight, Wednesday, March 17, 1965 all paved roads in the Province of Prince Edward Island, except Trans Canada Highway from Borden to Charlottetown, are closed to all vehicles whose loaded weight exceeds 4,000 lbs. gross per axle.

When the temperature drops to 20 degrees above zero or colder, during the night time, vehicles are permitted to carry up to registered weight between 5 a.m. and 10 a.m. of the same day.

This notice is issued under authority of regulations published February 12, 1950.

NOTE: Vehicles travelling on Trans Canada Highway, from Borden to Charlottetown are permitted to carry up to registered weight. There will be no tolerance allowed over 18,000 lbs. gross per axle, or 32,000 lbs. gross per tandem axle.
