## Pearson Blasts Gov't In Light Of Jobless

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. CP—Figures prepared for the commission inquiring into unemployment insurance show that 335,000 persons may be jobless in 1964. Liberal Leader Pearson said here.

On the basis of those calculations, about 400,000 are expected to be jobless this year and 495,000 in 1963, he told an audience of about 400 in this steel town.

Mr. Pearson said: "These are not my figures. These are the figures prepared by the government's own experts. They are what is expected to happen unless we take effective action soon."

(The Dominion Bureau of Statistics' latest report on unemployment, issued April 24 covering the position as at mid-March, said unemployment at that time was 560,000 - 8.7 per cent of the labor force.)

(DBS lists the number of persons without jobs and seeking employment, based on a sampling of 35,000 households.)

If Prime Minister Diefenbaker was aware of the figures—as he should be—"how can he stand up and tell the Canadian people that we've never had it so good and there is nothing to worry about?"

## Beaverbrook Denies Feeling Of Animosity Toward Philip

LONDON (AP) — Lord Beaverbrook has denied any feeling of animosity toward Prince Philip but said he is disturbed by the prince's attitude toward the Common Market.

The Canadian-born publisher defined his position in a signed article in his Sunday Express.

He claimed Philip "entered the political arena" by urging Britain to join the Common Market.

Beaverbrook expressed regret he had himself failed in his "struggle for a political and commercial union" of the empire. That struggle is still reflected in the opposition voiced by Beaverbrook and his newspapers to the Common Market—an economic grouping with political overtones, of Belgium, France, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands and West Germany.

**OPPORTUNISTS HAVE RIGHT**

Referring to Philip by his title of Duke of Edinburgh, Beaverbrook said: "The opponents of our joining the European economic union have a right to strike back at the duke when he joins with the group of propagandists who hope to rush Britain into adopting the Common Market."

"And for myself, I don't care what public funds the duke spends on airplanes, helicopters, motors and railway trains. His expense accounts don't interest me."

"But his political pronouncements do disturb me. It is my firm belief that the Common Market, which he supports, will in effect destroy the remnants of the system of imperial preference, and on that account the structure of the British Empire or Commonwealth, if you prefer it."

No immediate comment was available from Buckingham Palace.

## U.S. Boosts Use Of Steel

CLEVELAND (AP) — United States steel production will continue to decline until August, but steel consumption is rising and in the second quarter will show a seven-to-10-per-cent increase over the first quarter, Steel magazine said.

Ingot production this quarter could be 18 per cent under the 30,600,000 tons produced in the first quarter, the weekly journal of metalworking said. But shipments of finished steel won't drop that much, Steel predicted, because:

1. General Motors will continue using steel at a high rate and postpone its inventory adjustments until fall.

2. Can-makers step up consumption as they move into the peak season.

3. Structural fabricators and roadbuilders increase orders as they reach their peak work season.

"Mills are supplying part of the market requirements by processing semi-finished steel that they melted long ago," the magazine said.

Steel's composite scrap price dropped \$2 from the previous week to \$28.33 a gross ton the magazine reported. That was the lowest in eight years.

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## Nehru Refuses Chinese Demand For Withdrawal

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Prime Minister Nehru has rejected Communist Chinese demands that India withdraw from border checkpoints in mountainous Kashmir.

Nehru told Parliament he had received a summary of a protest note from the Chinese demanding that India withdraw its soldiers from two new checkposts in the disputed Ladakh area of Kashmir bordering Tibet.

"We propose to remain where we are and not move because of Chinese threats," Nehru said.

He said the summary was based on the assumption that Indian posts were set up on Chinese territory but added that his government believed the disputed land belonged to India.

The Indian leader also assured Parliament that Indian defenses in the area were "quite adequate."

Nehru also labelled as "absolutely wrong" a Communist Chinese government communique, quoting a Nationalist Chinese report, saying that Tibetan refugees in India were being recruited to train in Formosa as future Tibetan rebel leaders.

Nehru said the 30,000 Tibetan refugees in India were being settled in agricultural areas and India hoped they would maintain their own traditions.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

But since he does not see where the queen is located, he should try to exhaust every avenue of approach before committing himself to the critical guess.

After winning the diamond lead with the ace and drawing two rounds of trumps, he cashes the ace of clubs and ruffs a club. A diamond to the king is followed by another club ruff, and then, after trumping a diamond in dummy, he ruffs the last club.

The purpose of these plays is to force the defenders to reveal their distribution. Thus, in the actual case, it becomes clear that West started with exactly one spade, six diamonds and four clubs. This information is gleaned as each defender follows or fails to follow suit.

South now knows that West must have been dealt exactly two hearts, neither more nor less. He likewise knows that East must therefore have been dealt precisely five hearts.

Declarer draws this knowledge to work by drawing the reason: able conclusion that East, who started with five hearts, is more likely to have been dealt the queen than West, who started with only two hearts. In fact, the odds, mathematically, are 5 to 2 that East's hand contains the queen of hearts.

Accordingly, South plays the jack of hearts to the king and then finesses the ten on the way back. As it happens, the finesse works and he makes the grand slam.

Of course, declarer cannot be sure that his method of play will succeed—heavy favorites sometimes lose—but he can do no better than follow the indicated odds.

## Holding Unit Buys Shoe Firm

MONTREAL (CP) — Trans-Canada Corporation Fund, a holding company controlled by Montreal financier J. Louis Levesque, has bought control of the Montreal shoe manufacturing firm of Albert Lambert Inc., it was announced here.

Lambert directors said they have accepted Trans-Canada Corporation's bid of \$47.80 a share for their own holdings of 35,925 of the 41,500 class B voting shares.

The stock, listed on the Canadian Stock Exchange, sold at \$25 last week, but has jumped up to Thursday's price of \$47.50 on the strength of rumors.
