Teachers from the ten provinces of Canada have completed a three-day meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Teachers' Federation. Sessions were held in the Chateau Laurier, Ottawa, January 15, 16 and 17.

OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

The administration of education in each province is carried on by a Department of Education, under the Minister of Education, who is a member of the cabinet.
