

Islanders Outclassed By Beavers 5-2

Rangers In 5-3 Win Over Detroit Red Wings In N.H.L. Game Sunday

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (CP) — Defenceman Allan Stanley scored two goals tonight as New York Rangers skated to a well-earned 5-3 victory over Detroit Red Wings before a Madison Square Garden crowd of 13,206.

Making the most of their scoring chances, the Rangers broke a 3-3 deadlock at 8:42 of the third period when Stanley took a pass from little Tony Leswick to fool goalie Terry Sawchuk with a sizzling 15-footer. Ed Slowinski salted away the decision with another counter at 16:29 on a screened shot from 30 feet out.

Chuck Rayner, New York goalie, suffered a cut that required two stitches under his left eye when struck by Ted Lindsay's stick during a wild melee around the Ranger net in the final minutes.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Chicago Black Hawks 4-3 in a National Hockey League game tonight before 9,466 fans who saw the luckless Hawks go through their 21st winless game.

The loss was the eighth in a row for the last-place Chicago team which, through its 21-game streak, has managed only three wins.

The Hawks tied the N. H. L.'s longest previous winless run—in 1943 New York Rangers, beginning Jan. 23, lost 17 and tied four.

The Leafs had superior attacking throughout and apparently were never too hard pressed.

MONTREAL 1, BOSTON 1

BOSTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—Montreal Canadiens protected their slim third-place margin over Boston Bruins tonight by playing a 1-1 National Hockey League tie here. An audience of 8,796 boomed loudly as referee Bill Chadwick nullified two apparent Boston goals, one in the opening period and another in the final.

Woody Dumart's goal 49 seconds after the game's opening faceoff was Boston's only legal tally.

Only score for Montreal was fired by Doug Harvey, unassisted at 12:09, of the second session.

Harvey wound up at the blue line and let go a few feet inside it, the puck whizzing into the left corner, knee-high.

Dumart banged home Boston's goal after the disc dropped in the crease in front of Gerry McNeil

who had stopped Bill Quackenbush's long shot. Quackenbush received the puck from Bill Schmidt whose pass was deflected by Dumart.

On the first nullified goal, Chadwick ruled Schmidt's stick had been held too high (above the hip by hockey rules) as he deflected a long drive by Bill Quackenbush into the Montreal net.

At 17:10 of the third period, Schmidt swung round the Montreal cage and seemingly poked the disc past McNeil. The light was flashed on by the goal judge but Chadwick ruled the Boston captain had kicked it in with his skate.

Canadiens still have a one-point edge over the fourth-place Bruins.

Bill Ezinicki played his first game since being fined for fighting and was penalized twice on two minor rulings.

Ezinicki, Lindsay Suspended, Fined

BOSTON, Jan. 28 (CP)—The president of the National Hockey League Saturday suspended Boston's Bill Ezinicki and Detroit's Ted Lindsay for three games and fined them \$300 each for a high-sticking and fist-throwing fight.

The penalties were the stiffest handed out by Clarence S. Campbell, now in his fifth year as League president.

The crackdown, which resulted from a fight on Detroit ice last Thursday, appeared to prove:

1. Heavy high-sticking duels will not be tolerated.
2. Linesmen must be more alert in future to break up fights between players.

Holding down second spot in the Cape Breton League race, the Miners have been a going concern in that circuit of late, and only as recently as Saturday night, garnered a 3-2 verdict of the league leading Sydney Millionaires.

An entirely new team for Island fans, the Miners should make a great opponent for the powerful Islanders. It has all the prospects of a terrific game of hockey, and will at the same time give local fans the opportunity of seeing yet another product of the Cape Breton circuit in action.

Fans will also have the pleasure of seeing one of their former Islanders players in action with the Miners, in the person of Bob Gray, who made such a hit with the casual customers here earlier in the season when he performed with the Garnet and Gold pucksters.

Yes — all roads will lead to the Forum tomorrow night when the mighty Islanders clash with the Glac Bay Miners.
